Admiral von Tirpitz, Naval Adviser of Kaiser Wilhelm



THE leading war authorities agree that the present European war will be chiefly decided on the seas. The navies of England, France, Russia and Germany are all up to date and prepared for almost any emergency. England's navy ranks first and Germany's second among the world's powers. Admiral von Tirpitz, one of the greatest of the Kaiser's fighters, is one of the most important men in Germany in the present circumstances. He is laying out the plans for the sea campaign and is probably the chief adviser of the Kaiser in regard to matters affecting the navy.

Emperor Francis Joseph, Ally of the German Empire



EMPEROR FRANCIS JOSEPH of Austria-Hungary, who precipitated the European war by attacking Serbia, is the oldest ruler among the continental crowned heads. He is eighty-four years old, but still retains a marked amount of vitality. The assassination of his nephew, the Archduke Francis Ferdinand, and his consort by the Serbians deeply affected the emperor, who considered the act a blow against his own regime. Emperor Francis Joseph is the ally of Germany in the present international outbreak and has offered his vast army to the aid of the Kaiser.
