Farmer Gives A New Illustration.
Two or three patrons of various schools were in the city yesterday and while standing on a street corner discussing the fact that many schools change their teachers every year, one of the gentlemen spoke up and said, "Well, I am a farmer, and when I first went to farming I planned my plantation just like I wanted it and have kept it so ever since, making improvements wherever I could. Some changes are being made in the stock, with a number of additions, and the whole place will be much improved in appearance when the work is completed. This is one of the most popular drug stores in the city.
Sidewalk Soon To Be Opened.
Contractor Lowe, who is erecting the new Blue Ridge passenger station on Main street, told a reporter for The Intelligencer yesterday that he plans to have the sidewalk opened up by the middle of next week. The elevator shaft to be used in the construction of the new station comes up on the sidewalk but enough room is left to allow free passage and as soon as the sidewalk cement is poured it will be possible to open a part of the walk-way. This will be a great relief to pedestrians traveling along Main street.
Secretary Whaley Is Confined To Bed.
Porter A. Whaley, secretary of the Anderson chamber of commerce, contracted a severe cold a few days ago and yesterday he was confined to his bed. Mr. Whaley was ill Thursday and remained at home for a part of the day but yesterday his condition was not improved. His friends trust that his indisposition may be of short duration.
Ford Racer Has Arrived.

Aggressive Anderson Being Mailed Now.

The Publicity Bureau of the Chamber of Commerce yesterday shipped 300 copies of the August issue of Aggressive Anderson, the organization's publicity medium, to Industrial and Land Commissioner M. V. Richards of the Southern Railroad, at Washington.
Mr. Richards wrote the organization, asking that a batch of the publication be sent him for distribution in the central west, in which territory the Southern Railroad maintains a force of ten men, at work for the South, expecting the possibilities of this section for agricultural and industrial development.
It is also stated that to date about 1,400 copies of Aggressive Anderson have been mailed out, being sent to every inquirer on file in the office.

Rev. J. H. Gibboney Implying Slowly.

A letter has been received here from Wytchville, Va., which is the home of the Rev. J. Hallar Gibboney, rector of Grace Episcopal church, stating that Mr. Gibboney has just passed through a successful operation for appendicitis, and is convalescing nicely, though he is still very weak. According to the letter, Rev. Mr. Gibboney will hardly be able to return to Anderson to take up his pastoral and sacramental duties until sometime about the middle of next month.
Mr. Gibboney was in a very weak condition for several weeks before going to his home in Virginia for the operation which was performed upon him, it not then being known exactly from what he was suffering.

As Ligon & Ledbetter's big truck was backing up yesterday to the front of their establishment on Main street, the driver of the vehicle over-estimated the distance to the curbing and as a result the heavy truck struck one of the white way posts a tremendous blow. The center globe on the post was shattered into a hundred pieces and it is probable that all of the tungsten globes on the post were burned out.

Mr. Smythe On Cotton Situation.

Ellison A. Smyth, president of the Cotton Manufacturers' Association of South Carolina, has sent the following communication to The Manufacturers' Record:
"I do not expect any early developments of an enlarged foreign trade with the Orient or South America that will bring about a larger consumption of cotton in this country. I believe Southern bankers and merchants will aid in every possible way to prevent too much distressed cotton being thrown on the market early in the season, so as to break down a fair average.
"I believe England will soon control the Atlantic ocean, also the Pacific, and when this is done, exports of cotton to mills in Spain, France, Italy and England will be resumed. Until this result is achieved it is hard to estimate the effects the war will have on the trade of this country."

EFFORT IS MADE RAISE MORE STOCK

Agricultural Department of the Chamber of Commerce Advocates Raising Stock

It was announced today by the agricultural department, chamber of commerce, that a meeting of the Anderson County Live Stock Association would be called for some time early in September or the latter part of this month, for the purpose of considering means and methods of taking immediate action to increase cattle and hog production in Anderson county, in view of the present high prices for meat products, and the possibility of an increasingly high-priced market.
It will be remembered that this spring three carloads of western bred cattle were shipped to Anderson county through the efforts jointly of the chamber of commerce and Clemson College, Bureau of Animal Industry, and if arrangement can be perfected it is planned to have Mr. S. K. Williams, special live stock demonstrator, who recently succeeded J. C. Watt as such demonstrator, to make plans for a second trip to Kansas and Missouri to purchase additional cattle, and possibly hogs, though it is believed that hogs in sufficient quantities can be secured nearer home, possibly in Northwestern Tennessee, Southern Virginia and Maryland.
