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(By Associated Press.)

Washington. August 22.—Canned salmon today blocked passage through the senate of the bill for the establishment, of governments in spection and certification of deposits in cotton warehouses.

To avoid a contest Senator Hoke Smith, in charge of the bill, accepted amendments to extend the same privileges to tobacco and naval stores warehouses. Senator Lee of Maryhand, had the bill amended to recognize state Tobacco warehouse systems, Then Senator Lane, of Oregon, proposed that it be extended to canned salidon. Ho urged that the European war had developed the same distressing conditions for canned salignment and for cetten, tobacco and turpenting.
