Washington, Aug. 22.—Final arrangements were completed today for the conference here Monday on the cotton situation at which representatives of the government and about 200 business and professional men from all sections of the country will be present. The conference was called primarily to discuss the cotton situation, but representatives from the tobacco growing states also will be present and the condition of facing tobacco planters will be brought to the attention of the government.

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EXTREME CRUELTY
Austrians Said to Have Committed Horrible Acts
Paris, Aug. 22.—The Serbian legation here brought to the attention of the government a dispatch addressed by the Serbian foreign minister to Belgrade to the Spanish minister to Roumania, in which it is declared that the commander in chief of the Austrian army ordered his troops to burn crops and villages and kill the peaceable inhabitants of Serbia. In the report of the Austrian minister to Dr. Na river they left behind them many killed or disabled, chiefly old men, women and children.
The Serbian foreign minister asked the Spanish minister to inform Austria that Serbia would be compelled to take measures of reprisal.

THE DAY IN CONGRESS
Washington, Aug. 22.—Senate met at 11 a. m.
