ANDERSON MAY JOIN THE SHOW

Invitation Is To Be Extended To This City To Join South Carolina Horse Show Circuit

A letter was received in Anderson yesterday from H. T. Mills, of Greenville, secretary of the South Carolina Horse Show Association, in which Mr. Mills says that an invitation will shortly be extended to Anderson to join the association and hold a show in this city next year. This association is an inter-city affair and is composed of the cities of Greenville, Greenwood, Bennettsville, Florence, Columbia and Sumter.

It is understood that all the cities in the circuit come out all right at the last show, from a financial standpoint, with the exception of Greenville and that city lost about \$1,000, due, it is said, to the inclement weather prevailing all through the Greenville show and the fact that the Greenville show was going on in Spartanburg at the time.

Anderson county, according to Mr. T. H. H. (Brother), probably has more live stock than any other county in the state and Anderson would be able to make a splendid showing at it if it decided to enter this city.

A majority of the live stock dealers in Anderson favor this city going into the venture and it is understood that the business men of the city are favorable to the attempt.

CLEMSON WILL HELP THE GRAIN FESTIVAL

CANNOT GIVE ANY CASH TO SWELL PRIZE LIST

IS TO SEND EXHIBIT

Dr. Riggs Explains That Clemson Does Not Get All the Money That It Collects

A committee consisting of Furman Smith, Porter A. Whitley, J. H. Vandiver, Guy Norris, Foster L. Brown, H. J. Smith, Wade Drake, Mayor J. H. Godfrey and William Banks yesterday visited Clemson College to enlist the sympathies of the management there in the Southeastern Grain Festival to be held here the third week of next August. This is planned on a large scale, as a statewide affair, on account of the unusual success of the grain show held here the third Tuesday in July, when \$250 in prizes were awarded. It is hoped next year to offer something like \$5,000 in prizes, of which amount several hundred dollars have been contributed already.

Dr. W. M. Riggs, president of the college, and W. W. Long, state farm demonstration agent, were found at the college and they showed great interest in the proposition. However, Dr. Riggs explained that the college cannot give any money toward the awarding of prizes and cannot give any scholarship in such a case, as such, as he would like to.

All educational institutions will have to trim their sails this winter until the conditions settle a little more, and Clemson is one institution which is greatly misjudged the college itself is conducted at a much lower cost than many other institutions in the state, considering the per capita. There is some money which annually goes to the college, but it never reaches the college and is expended on experimental work in other sections of the state. The college has no more money than it needs, and in fact needs every cent that it gets for collegiate work.

However, it was explained that the grain festival in Anderson at the farmers' institute at Clemson next August might be made to work to mutual advantage and Clemson will send a superb exhibit to Anderson on account of the grain show. Small grain is the hobby of Mr. Long's life and he is enthusiastic over the Anderson proposition and will leave nothing undone to give this city a splendid exhibit for the grain festival next August.

Furman Smith, who originated the grain festival idea, was delighted to receive yesterday a telegraphic order from Alabama for several hundred bushels of the only that won the prizes at the show here. He had sent samples last week and predicted that he would land the order. The fame of the Anderson grain festival has gone abroad. These prize oats for seed bring tremendous prices.

A STRONG APPEAL

General Baden Powell Instructing Boy Scouts in England.
 New York, Aug. 24.—The nominal headquarters of the Boy Scouts of America today made public instructions by Lieutenant General Sir S. S. Baden Powell which he has issued to thousands of troops of boy scouts in the British Empire. The instructions, in the form of a statement under the heading "The Great War Cry," are in part as follows:

"The sudden rush to arms by the great nations of Europe against each other over a comparatively small incident in Serbia, shows why it is so essential to be prepared at all times for what is possible, even though it may not be probable.

"Also it shows how little are the peoples of these countries as yet in sufficient mutual sympathy as to render war impossible between them. This will be so until better understanding is established between them. For us do what we can through the scout brotherhood to promote this in the future. For the immediate present we have duties to our country to perform."

HEAVY FIGHTING

London, Aug. 25.—"Since yesterday morning the Germans have been attacking Charleroi, which the French are holding," says the Daily Mail's Ostend correspondent telegraphing on Monday. "The Germans invaded the town from the Montigny side and came out by the turning bridges, in front of the railway station.

"There was a hot fight for the possession of the bridges as well as for the railway station and other buildings. German shells are falling in the town. Houses on the left of the Hotel Europe, as seen from the railway station, appeared seriously damaged. A mass of French artillery and troops in endless lines poured out. It is said, toward Charleroi and the Germans were driven back with a serious loss."
