A persistent rumor was going the rounds in Anderson yesterday to the effect that Governor Cole L. Blease may move to this city when he completes his term of office as governor of the state. It is said that the governor plans to make his home at the handsome Summers estate, just outside the city and to practice law in Anderson. H. Clint Summers, a brother-in-law of the Governor, said yesterday that he knew nothing of the governor's plans, but had never heard such a statement before. However, friends of Mr. Blease say that he has been giving the matter consideration. His term expires in January. Another rumor is he has a splendid offer of a law partnership.

The Salvation post in Anderson announced several weeks ago that plans were under way for having a night of entertainment for the poor people and tonight was chosen. Ensign Belcher says that the people of the city have responded very liberally to his call for funds, with which to arrange tonight's prizes, refreshments, etc., and that the occasion should be a success. A program consisting of recitations, music, etc., will also be rendered tonight, beginning at 8 o'clock. The entertainment will take place in the Army hall.

Visitors Going To Clemson College.

A number of well known men from different sections of the State spent a few hours in Anderson yesterday, en route to Clemson college to attend the "Home Coming Week" festivities. Among the visitors to be seen here yesterday was Henry C. Tillman of Greenwood, a well known attorney of that city and popular in the state. Several other visitors were also here and it was said last night that the attendance of old students at the college for the week would be considerably larger than had been anticipated.

A Revival at Neal's Creek

Revival services are in progress at Neal's Creek church this week and it is said that great interest is being manifested. Pastor Hiott is being ably assisted by Rev. J. H. Anderson of Central and Prof. R. M. Bolding, also of Pickens county, who has charge of the music. It is said that interest in the services is growing, and that the prospects for a sweeping revival are bright.

Visit the Falls On An Excursion.

The Southern railway will today operate its annual excursion from Anderson to Tallulah Falls. A very low round trip rate has been granted and it was said yesterday at the office of the Blue Ridge railway that a large number of tickets had been sold. The excursion train will leave Anderson this morning at 7:30, arriving at the Falls at 11:40 o'clock. Those who in-

tend making the trip are anticipating a great deal of pleasure.

Taking Names Of New Pupils.

E. C. McCants, superintendent of the Anderson city schools, announced yesterday that he will begin the enrollment of pupils for the graded schools of the city on September 1. The schools of Anderson will all open on the morning of September 14 and between the first and the fourteenth Mr. McCants will be in his office every day to take the names of pupils and he says that he expects a very large enrollment for this year and indications now are that the city will have more pupils in the schools for the coming year than ever before.

Business Will Soon Improve.

Anderson people said yesterday that they could notice an improvement in local business conditions since the election is over with and from this time on business will steadily pick up. This will be due to two reasons, the first being that an election always has a tendency to demoralize the public for a few weeks before it takes place and the other reason is that the Fall season is now coming on, the best season of the year for the merchants. Anderson will hardly suffer as severe results from the foreign war as many pessimists have feared.

Station for College Girls.

A contractor has arrived in Anderson for the purpose of erecting a small station at College Place on the Piedmont & Northern lines. This station will be for the benefit of passengers coming to and from Anderson college and will be of much convenience, especially as the college girls will soon begin to arrive in Anderson for the Fall term. The president of the institution says that he expects Anderson college to have a most successful year.

Mrs. Brownlee Is Ill at Hospital.

Mrs. Irving Brownlee has been taken to the Anderson county hospital, and it is understood that she is quite ill there. When Mrs. Brownlee was seized with the attack Mr. Brownlee was in the mountains of North Carolina. He was summoned by telegraph and arrived in the city yesterday and several of Mrs. Brownlee's relatives have arrived to be at her bedside. The people of Anderson all hope that her condition may soon show some improvement.

ELECTION NEWS.

Moore Mars, senator from Abbeville, was defeated by J. M. Nickles, anti-Blease; and W. N. Graydon and F. C. Robinson, anti-Blease, were elected to the house. Melvin Ashby, Blease, didn't run this time. Howard Moore, Bleaseite, was elected.

For governor, Korshaw county gave M. L. Smith 1,140 and Richards 675. That is the home county of both.

Laurens county gave Cooper nearly 2,233 votes and Irby 1,259. Both are Laurens men.

Sumter county gave Manning 1,380 votes against 998 for all opponents.

Jasper county, always regarded as for Blease, gave Smith a good majority.

Senator E. R. Ginn, of Hampton, will go into a second race with W. Fred Lightsey.

For the house there will be a sec-

ond race between George Warren, Bleaseite, and J. W. Mzrael.

Odom, anti-administration, was re-elected to the house from Chesterfield by large vote.

A. F. Spigener succeeds F. H. Weston in the state senate from Richland county, defeating McMaster and Welsh. Spigener was stragout anti-Blease. He is a young man and had never before been in politics.

Creech, the Barnwell county member of the house, who was arrested for passing bogus checks, was turned down for re-election. He was a Bleaseite.

Jas. H. Fowler, the Columbia magistrate who had Creech arrested and who, subsequently, was removed from office by Blease, was vindicated by the people of Columbia, receiving a majority of 300 over two opponents.

W. R. Bradford, of Fort Mill, will be one of York county's representatives. He is one of the best informed men in the state and will be a credit to his county.

Lancaster county sends a splendid representative to the state senate in D. Becco Williams, brother of T. Yancy Williams, who was in the senate for eight years and was defeated by

Bleaseism and T. J. Strait, S. E. Balle and J. Copeland Massey were elected to the house, Claude N. Sapp, the Blease leader in the house for the last two years, was left at home.

Harrelson, the Blease candidate for the legislature in Marion county, was defeated for re-election.

J. K. Durst, of Greenwood, goes to the house of representatives. W. T. Jones and Strom are in the second race. Bowles was re-elected.

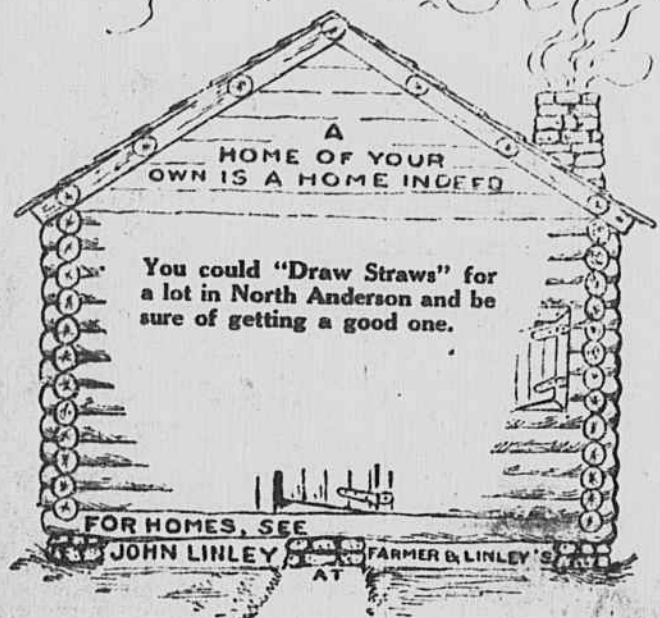
G. L. Toole was elected to the house from Aiken. He was once senator from that county.
