BRICK RECORD BROKEN BY ORDER YESTERDAY

ANDERSON CONCERN GOT BIG CONTRACT FOR THE THEATRE

Anderson County Brick and Probably Anderson Stone Will Be Used in Handsome Building

The largest single order for brick ever placed in this county was awarded yesterday by the contractor who will build the Anderson theatre. The contract goes to the big brick kiln at Pendleton and calls for 800,000 bricks, all of which will be used in the construction of Anderson's new play house. Builders said last night that it was a larger order than had ever been let at one time in this city before and that probably the new building will require more brick than any other building in the city.

The contract was awarded by Nicholas Rooney, local representative of the S. W. Atkinson Co., of Atlanta, Ga., which firm has the contract for erecting the handsome new edifice. Mr. Rooney also sub-let the excavation work to Clarence Osborn, who began on the work yesterday. He estimates that he will be able to complete all of the excavating by Saturday and be ready for the contractors to begin their work.

Mr. Rooney directed that the first consignment of his brick order be delivered in this city Thursday and from that time on as fast as the manufacturer could furnish them and it is very evident that Anderson's theatre will soon be completed.

It was said yesterday that the Williamson quarry is fighting for the contract to furnish the crushed stone used in the construction of the building and it is believed that they will get it.

The building permits required for the city before a new building can be constructed was taken out yesterday and so far as can now be seen there is not a single hitch in the plans or preparations for the amusement place.

SEVEN MURDER CASES FOR CRIMINAL COURT

SOLICITOR READY TO BEGIN WORK

MEMMINGER HERE

Doubt About Presiding Judge Is Settled By Announcement That Popular Jurist Will Preside

The doubt about whether Judge Memminger, Judge Wilson or Judge Devore would come to Anderson to preside at the coming term of the court of general sessions for this county was settled yesterday when definite announcement was made that Judge R. Wither's Memminger will come to Anderson and open court here on the morning of Monday, September 7. Judge Memminger is popular with the lawyers of Anderson and he is popular with the people of the county and he will receive a cordial welcome.

The coming term of court will last hardly more than two weeks, although it is understood that it could last longer if necessary. However, Clerk of Court Pearman has drawn jurists for but two weeks and it is believed that the business of the court can be dispatched in that length of time.

All told there are 45 or 50 cases to be tried at this term of court but Solicitor K. P. Smith says that he expects to get the docket pretty well cleaned up in a fortnight. There are seven murder cases to be tried at this term of court, these being:

Claude Farris, charged with the murder of J. C. Keller. It will be remembered that Poore was a member of the police force of Williamston and that Kelly was an ex-police man. The affair created great interest in Williamston when it arose.

Oscar Bozeman, a negro, charged with the murder of Matthew Jones.

Archie Colyer, charged with the murder of Rosamond Walker. This killing occurred near Belton and the defendant is only a young boy. It is believed that this may be nothing more than a case of accidental killing.

Will Garrison, charged with the murder of Will Hall. This killing occurred on Peoples Row in Anderson and was the usual negro killing about a woman.

W. R. Harris, a white man, is charged with killing Lewis Goode in the Fork section of the county.

Glynes Davis, a negro, is charged with killing Jim Emerson, another negro, in North Anderson last Sunday night.

In addition to these cases the murder case was continued from the last term of court, this being Will Belcher

F. H. DOMINICK MUCH PROVOKED

Talks of Bringing Suit For Libel Against Certain Newspapers in District

Fred H. Dominick, candidate for congress in the third district, stated last night that he is very much provoked on account of a recent publication and unless retractions and apologies are made it is his intention to prosecute one or more papers for violation of the libel laws.

The article to which he refers appeared in a recent paper first and later in an Anderson paper. It alleged that Mr. Dominick had held a secret conference with supporters of a hotel in Seneca and had announced his determination to quit the postmaster there and at some other points and to name some of his own men.

Mr. Dominick says the only color of truth in the whole matter is the fact that he spent a few minutes in Seneca on the day mentioned. He was on his way to Pickens and held no conference.

Mr. Dominick spoke rather bitterly of the matter in connection with other charges made against him. He was provoked about a tale that he had shipped liquor to Central and to Seneca. The only truth in these statements, he said, is the fact that packages such about the size of quart bottles, were shipped to him at those places. Each package contained circulating printed in the Intelligencer office. Mr. Dominick says printers ink is less dangerous in an election.

Throughout the campaign, Mr. Dominick says that he has treated his opponents fairly and he will give \$100 to anyone who can prove any creditable act on his part in the campaign, or can prove that he has made any promises of place or other thing of value to get votes.

IMPORTANT CASE HEARD TUESDAY

Judge Prince Handed Down Decision in Case Brought Before Him From Oconee County

Judge Prince yesterday handed down an order in a case sent here from Oconee county, which is rather important. Some time ago the Mayor of Seneca appeared before Judge Prince in this city and asked for some relief because parties were building a corrugated iron gin house within the fire limits of their town. At that time Judge Prince granted a restraining order and he has now changed this into a temporary injunction, which means that the case will not be disposed of until the next term of court is held in Oconee county. However, in view of the fact that the ginning season will be almost over by that time, Judge Prince said that the matter might be referred to the Master of Oconee county to take testimony and reach a decision, provided the interested parties so desired. However, it is understood that the county planter to build the gin house have about decided to abandon the plan and move the building outside the town's fire limits.
