"A Man of the People" - Frank Shealy of Lexington

Candidate for Railroad Commissioner Had a Hard Fight in Life, but Sobriety and Integrity Have Won Out

Columbia, Sept. 2. - The office of railroad commissioner is a very important one. The man who is elected to this position has it for six years continuously. It is very important therefore that a good man should be chosen.

The position requires more than firm character, honesty and morality; it requires business and administrative ability and technical knowledge. No real railroad man has ever been elected to the position and that has always been a drawback in getting best results from the office.

The people of South Carolina now have an opportunity to get the services of a man who has had actual experience in track laying, in firing a locomotive, and on the other hand has prospered in life through his own efforts and has a broad vision of life and sees the rights of the great public as a shipper.

Frank W. Shealy, who is the candidate referred to, has had an experience really remarkable. His father, a Confederate soldier, died when the boy was but 12 years old. While yet in his teens, this boy "cracked" as a section hand to make money to support his mother and four brothers and sisters. Later he was a fireman in an old "wood-burner" locomotive. Subsequently he became a carpenter and contractor and a saw mill man, and in every undertaking was successful.

Twelve years ago he entered politics and offered for county treasurer against the man who was supposed to be the strongest man in politics in Lexington county. Shealy was elected by a large vote after a clean campaign. He was re-elected three times. In 1908 he was elected clerk of court over a strong man. In 1912 he was re-elected on the first ballot over three opponents.

As county treasurer he introduced the plan now in vogue in every county to have the tax receipts made out in advance so that the tax payers should not be kept waiting around

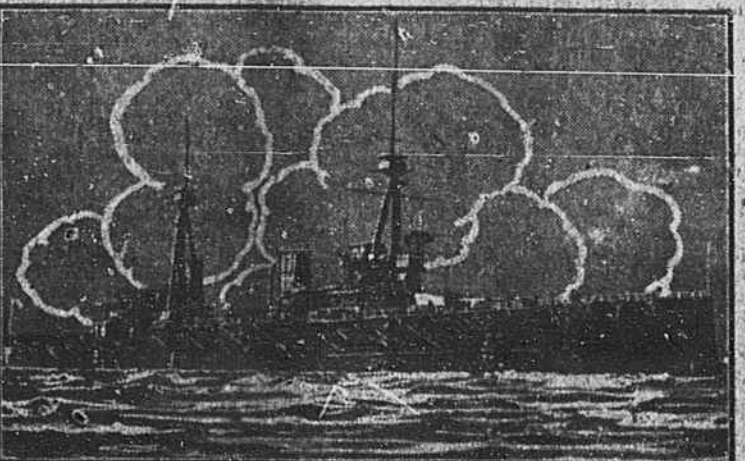
