## PRINCIPAL CITIES HAVE PLAN OUTLINED

**WATSON WRITES TO DIFFERENT CITIES**

## GRAIN ELEVATORS

**Commissioner of Agriculture Makes Suggestion as To How To Remedy Situation**

The three principal cities of the state, Charleston, Columbia and Anderson, were chosen by Commissioner of Agriculture E. J. Watson for the carrying out of a plan which has been in mind. In order to help them the tide that is sweeping South Carolina and the cotton market in general, because of the European war, E. J. Watson has written letters to the Columbia, Charleston and Anderson chambers of commerce in an effort to get them interested in projecting a company for the purpose of building and operating grain elevators in this state.

The benefit from this on the surface will be twofold, it is argued. The establishment of a grain crop will bring in money to the state at the time of the year when remuneration from cotton is slow, and also it will enable the people of the state to get their grain products at first hand instead of sending to the middle west. Another reason for immediate consideration of such a step, as Commissioner Watson points out in his letter, is that the state has got to carry over until next year the bumper cotton crop of this year.

In his letter to Anderson, Mr. Watson says in part: "What we have to do is to plant a grain crop now and get it off, and then throw the same acreage into corn, and there your elevator will come in again. I have before me today the figures from one farmer this year who planted his large plantation entirely in oats, and has reaped a harvest of \$50 per acre from that crop. He then planted the same acreage in corn, and has reaped a harvest of \$45 per acre from the corn. He writes to me that the cost of the production of both crops did not exceed \$10 per acre. This was done before the war broke out."

"I am therefore taking the liberty of suggesting to you that you call a meeting of your business men at once, launch this enterprise, which cannot cost much in the way of permanent investment and announce to the people of the Piedmont section that Anderson is going to have a grain elevator through which they can market their grain products at best prices. If this can be done right now, and a positive announcement be made, I believe that practically every field in the Piedmont will be devoted to grain crops. If this is done, we ought to have a money crop bringing the money to us by spring, and converting hopelessness into happiness. A grain crop properly handled in the south, I believe, will bring more money in return, if planted just as soon as the fields can be cleared and made ready, even without fertilizer, than cotton ever did on the same acreage."

"I would impress upon you the necessity for quick action and a definite announcement, so that the farmers of the state can understand how their marketing will be conducted, with grain, for grain is something they have never dealt with for the market before. If this be done they will feel sure that marketing facilities will be available, and they will unhesitatingly proceed to do that which is now the only sensible thing that they can do in their hour of distress."

## MARKET REPORT

### Dry Goods

New York, Sept. 5.—Severe financial conditions combined with great difficulty in readjusting cloth prices to the fifty per cent lower level current on cotton prices account for constantly increasing caution in the purchase of goods by jobbers, printers, converters and general users. Prices on heavy colored cottons are higher in some instances, while further reductions are noted in some constructions of wide print cloths and other unfinished goods. There has been some improvement in the outlook for exports as some ports can now be reached and orders that were held in abeyance have been reinstated. An inquiry for duck for export was received during the week for Hesitation in accepting late contracts for any goods in which dyes are used is still a feature of the situation. Cotton yarns have dropped to still lower price levels and the demand is still owing to the very unsettled conditions quotations are only nominal as follows:  
 Print cloths, 28 inch 64x64s, 3 1-4c; 38 1-2 inch 64x64s, 4c; bro wnsheetings, southern standard, 7 1-2 and 7 3-4c; denims, 9 ounce, 14c; tickings, 8 ounce, 13c; standard prints 5 1-4c; staple ginghams, 6 1-4c; dress ginghams, 9 1-4c.

### Chicago Grain

Chicago, Sept. 5.—Brief that the demand from Europe had been sufficiently discounted for the present led to a set back in wheat prices today after a spasmodic early bulge. In the end the market was steady at 3-4 to 1 3-8c under last night. Corn finished 3-8 to 1 5-8c down, oats 3-8c off to 1-8c up and provisions lowered a shade to 15c.

## BANDITS SHOT TWO PASSENGERS

**Two Masked Bandits Hold Up Grand Trunk Passenger Train Wounding Two Passengers**

Detroit, Mich., Sept. 5.—Two passengers on a Grand Trunk passenger train inbound from Toronto tonight, were shot and probably fatally wounded by two masked robbers who boarded the train soon after it entered the city. After obtaining money and valuables from the other passengers in the coach, the bandits disappeared. The men wounded are Cornelius Bozzerk, a traveling salesman of Berlin, Ohio, and Joseph Seltzer, of Shelby, Ohio. Bozzerk was shot through the stomach and physicians said that his recovery was doubtful. After Seltzer had been taken to the hospital it developed that his condition was not as serious as at first indicated and he is expected to recover. The robbers entered the parlor car of the train at Milwaukee Junction, within the city limits. Both immediately began firing revolvers and the passengers were ordered to hold up their hands. One bandit reached for a linen chest, grabbed a pillow slip and into this the passengers were ordered to drop their valuables. As one of robbers collected the booty his companion backed him up with the revolver.

After Bozzerk had been shot, Seltzer attempted to get into an adjoining coach and notify the train crew. He was not quick enough, however, and he fell with a bullet in his hip. At this juncture both bandits ran to the door and leaped off the train, carrying their plunder with them. The whole affair lasted but two or three minutes.

The passengers were unable to say how much money the robbers took, but it was claimed that several women propped money into the pillow slip and two men gave up their watches.

Within a few minutes after the robbery, the police had taken a half dozen suspects into custody.
