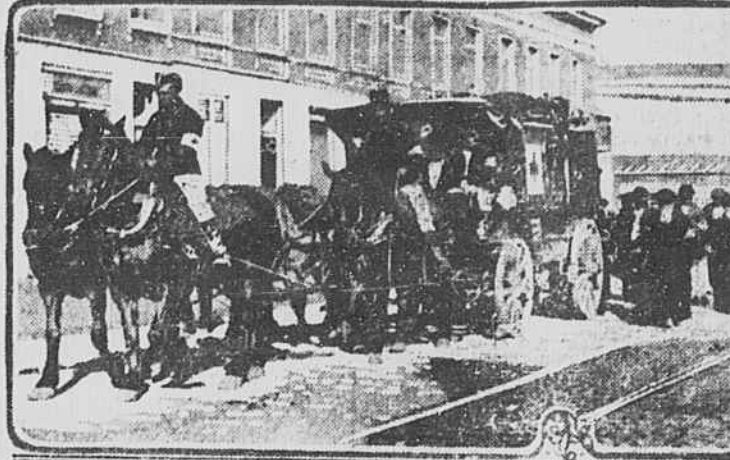

MARKET REPORT

New York Cotton

New York, Sept. 10.—Today's operations through the international committee of the New York cotton exchange resulted in the liquidation of 600 bales of December at 9.50. The sales were equally divided by the ballot between six local houses, and while the amount so far liquidated seems small as compared with the total interest outstanding, the fact that the plan is in working order has made a favorable impression on sentiment. It is also anticipated that any improvement in the European situation, which many think to be foreshadowed by recent war developments would lead to a rapid increase in the spot demand from Lancashire spinners, and sentiment as to the possibility of successfully working out of old commitments has also been encouraged by the reports of a steadier spot situation.

Liverpool Cotton

Liverpool, Sept. 10.—Cotton, spot, in better demand. Sales 3,000 bales, including 2,700 American on the basis of 6.00d for middling. Imports 434 bales, all American.

Dry Goods

New York, Sept. 10.—Cotton goods markets showed a firmer tone today. Raw silk was easier. Cotton yarns were weaker. Woolen goods were in broader demand.

Cotton Seed Oil

New York, Sept. 10.—Cotton seed oil was more active with prices higher on covering for the account of traders who had sold abroad, together with buying of late months by refiners who find difficulty in securing crude. Tenders of 1,350 barrels were made six contract sales 28.000 barrels. Final prices were 5 to 10 points net higher.

Washington, Sept. 10.—Senate met at 11 a. m. Adopted resolutions looking to the establishment of international commission on ocean freight rates. Amendments to liberalize the bank law were debated. Recessed at 6 p. m., until noon on Friday. House met at noon. The ways and means committee agreed on a war revenue bill which it is estimated will add \$107,000,000 a year to the government's revenue. The conference report on the trade commission bill was called up for consideration. Adopted conference report on Federal trade commission bill, which now goes to the president. A debate on general leasing bill to open up coal, oil, phosphate and other resources on public lands. Adjourned at 5:50 P. M. until noon on Friday.
