to J. E. Swearingen, state superinten-dent of education. He has sent out a letter to well known South Carolinians asking their opinion as to the nature of the compulsory education law to be considered at the next ses-sion of the legislature. He says that the only difference among friends of education is found in the terms of the

"It is certain." said Mr. Swearingen that the legislature of 1915 will be asked to work out a practical solu-tion of this question, hence it is highly important that the most practical and serviceeable measure be en-

It is pointed out by Mr. Swearingen that the law must deal with the following points:

The age of pupils, 7 to 13, or 8 to Maximum distance pupil walks, 3

niles or 2 1-2 miles.

Maximum number of pupils to be instructed by one teacher, certainly, not more than 50.

Free text books for pupils needing hem. Building to be erected at county and

state expense in districts unable to pay for adequate school houses. Liberal state appropriations for weak districts in order to provide a minimum term, preferably 7 months.

This policy will necessitate a tax of not less than one mill or omer than

than two mills.

Enforcement can be insured only by a truant officer and by adequate penalties. First, a warning; Second, a fine; Third, imprisonment or a chaingang senience.

Needed exemptions for certain classes of children.

Prohibition of the employment by corporations of liliterates under 21

corporations of illiterates under 21 years of age.

Length of school session during which attendance is compulsory. Since the Constitution of 1895 empowers district trustees to use district funds in their discretion, the school term must probably be regulated by school boards. In my opinion compulsory attendance should be required throughout the full session—9, 8, 7, 6, 5, 4 or three months. Such a provision will be flexible, will suit local needs and will help solve the difficulties of the race problem.
