ANDERSON COLLEGE OPENS DOORS TODAY

STRONG FACULTY HAS BEEN SECURED

PROSPECTS GOOD

Friends and Patrons of institution Will Gather at 9 O'clock To Witness the Ceremonies

The formal opening of Anderson College will take place this morning at 9 o'clock at which time friends and patrons of the institution will gather to assure the faculty of the college of their good wishes and of their hopes that this year may be more successful than the college has ever experienced.

It is understood that the trustees and their wives, the ladies of the college association, the mayor and members of the city council and various other friends will be present for the exercises this morning.

This afternoon and tomorrow will be devoted to enrolling and classifying the students and tomorrow the classes will be assigned and actual work will begin.

President Kinard said yesterday that he was well pleased over the prospects for this year and he believes that the success of the year's work is already assured.

The faculty for the coming year is probably a little stronger than that of any female college in the state.

Miss Helen P. Smith is a new member of the faculty, coming to this city as a graduate of Converse College and of Columbia University.

Miss Marie deVehe, a graduate of Randolph-Macon and of Columbia University, comes to Anderson to teach history and political science.

Patrons of the school will be glad to learn that Dr. Olga V. Pruitt has been secured for this session to act again as college physician and to have charge of the departments of physiology and hygiene.

One of the principal additions to the faculty for this year is Frederic Goode, who will be director of music.

Miss Sara E. Stranathan is to return this year and will again have charge of the department of voice.

Miss Nellie Smith, who comes from Beardston, Ill., will teach piano and violin.

The new art teacher, Miss Mary Dodson Ramsour, has been spending the summer in Paris.

Miss Robbie P. Wakefield, who returns to Anderson this year, will have charge of the school of expression and of physical culture.

The department of domestic science and art will be in charge this year of Miss Fellels Murray, who was in Anderson in this capacity last year.

Mrs. Ella B. Johnson, housekeeper for this session, is a native of Clifton but she was at a college for women in Missouri last year in this same capacity.

Katherine W. Shreve, who was a member for the college last year, will fill the same position this year.

All told the faculty of the institution is one of which the people of Anderson have every right to be proud and they are expecting great things of Anderson College for the coming year.

BUYING HORSES FOR FRENCH GOVERNMENT

LARGE NUMBER PURCHASED IN ANDERSON

FOR USE IN THE WAR

Two Dealers Came To This City and Selected Many Mounts For the French Artillery

Over 500 horses from Anderson and surrounding counties will be shipped to France within the next few weeks for use in the French artillery.

Some time ago two horse dealers, Cogging and Wilson by name, advertised that they would be in Anderson today but they did not state why they desired the horses.

Upon the arrival of the two dealers yesterday they announced that they were acting as agents for the French government and they purchased every horse offered weighing between 600 and 1,000 pounds.

All told, the horsemen purchased about 500 horses in Anderson and Greenwood county and the mounts will probably be shipped within the next few days.

BEAUTIFUL HOME WAS DESTROYED BY FIRE

SAMUEL MOORE LOST HIS HOME

SOME INSURANCE

Kerosene Oil in a Closet Was Responsible for Blaze Which Destroyed Very Handsome Home

An alarm of fire was turned in yesterday morning at 9:10 o'clock and within 30 minutes after that time the handsome home of Samuel Moore on River street, just opposite Bonna Vista park, was in ashes.

Mr. Moore went into a closet yesterday morning about 9 o'clock to search for a pair of shoes and struck a match. When he did so a part of the match dropped to the floor and struck a kerosene can and in an instant the entire floor was in a blaze.

The house was a pretty structure, costing over \$4,000. Mr. Moore carried \$3,000 insurance on the building and \$1,200 on the furniture but this hot began to cover the loss.

Some weeks ago Mr. Moore lost a home in Southwest Georgia by fire, the building being valued at more than \$6,000.

Mr. Moore said yesterday that he had made no plans as whether or not he would replace the house but it is probable that another building will be erected on the site of the burned building.
