MARKET REPORT

New York Cotton

New York, Sept. 16.—It was announced today by the conference committee in charge of the liquidation of the straddle interest on the New York Cotton Exchange that the price would be reduced to 5.50 for January-February in Liverpool and 9.50 for December in New York tomorrow. Some such action had been more or less generally expected and a hope was expressed in local circles that the cutting down of the price would lead to more active liquidation in Liverpool. There was no balloting for orders here today, notwithstanding the sales recently reported from the Liverpool stock, and so far only 1,000 bales of the New York interest have been liquidated, under the plans of the international conference. The slow progress of the liquidation is offset to some extent, however, by reports that the syndicate plan now seems likely to go through and by reports of further advance in the Southern spot markets. All the official quotations received today being about 1-4 higher. Continued good weather was reported in the South.

Liverpool Cotton

Liverpool, Sept. 16.—Cotton spot good on inquiry, business fair. Sales 1,600 including 3,400 American on the basis of 6000 for middling. Imports 5,567 bales including 2,098 American.

Cotton Seed Oil

New York, Sept. 16.—Cotton seed oil advanced early on short covering and the lard strength, but later eased off again, under hedge pressure and lack of bull support. September closed 8 points lower and the later months 2 points lower to 2 points higher. Sales 11,700. Tenders 1,700 barrels. The market closed barely steady. Spot 581 a 590; September 580 a 583.

Chicago Grain

Chicago, Sept. 16.—Wheat went soaring today largely because of reports of Austrian-German advantages that made the end of the war appear remote. After a rise of much as 5 cents a bushel, the market closed nervous with gains of 4 1-8 to 4 5-8 net. Corn found up 1-2 to 1 3-4 higher and oats at an advance of 1 3-4 to 1 7-8. In provisions the outcome ranged from 10 cents decline to 20 cents of extra cost.

Dry Goods

New York, Sept. 16.—Cotton goods markets were steady today. Worsteds yarns were firm and more active; cotton yarns in better demand. Surpluses were irregular; embroideries and lace quiet; silk markets easier.

EXTREME CRUELTY Continued From Page One.)

They pillaged the whole town. The following morning they took one man out of every three whom they had arrested the previous evening, and leading them outside of the city, shot them. Among these were the burgomaster of the town, his 15 year old son and his brother. "Then they compelled the remaining villagers to dig holes to bury their victims. "For three whole days they continued to pillage and set fire to everything in their way. "About 150 inhabitants of Aerschot are supposed to have thus perished. "The largest part of the city is destroyed. Five times the Germans tried to set fire to the church, having sacked the interior of its contents. The town records were destroyed or carried off. "It must be borne in mind that the civil population of Aerschot had been repeatedly warned by their burgomaster not to offer any resistance or commit any hostile act towards the invaders. The Germans shot at the fleeing citizens, set fire to private houses and sacked them. They wanted to make the victimized citizens declare that they, themselves, had set fire to their homes.

The Destruction of Louvain

The German army penetrated into Louvain after having set fire to the surrounding towns and villages. "From the moment of their entrance into the city, they requisitioned lodging and food for their troops. They entered every private bank and looted its reserve. They entered private residences and sacked and pillaged them and indulged in orgies of every description. "They took hostages; all the prominent men of the city were detained. Women and children were outraged and ill treated by the soldiers. "Previous to the German invasion the whole city had been warned repeatedly not to offer any resistance to the German troops, or to oppose hostile acts. More than that, all arms belonging to the civilians, down to fencible tools, had been ordered deposited several days previously in the city hall, and there was not a weapon found on any civilian. "On August 25, an engagement took place in the neighborhood of Louvain, between the German and the British troops. The Germans, repulsed and pursued by the Belgian troops, retreated towards Louvain in full panic. Many witnesses testify that at that moment the German garrison in Louvain was erroneously informed that Belgians were entering the city, immediately the German garrison, stationed at Louvain, withdrew towards the station where they clashed with their own troops, which were being pursued by the Belgians. Everything seems to point to the fact that a contact took place. "From that moment, pretending that the Belgian civilians had fired on the German troops, the Germans began bombarding the city. At the place where the affray started, not a single body was found of a civilian, proving that the population had not participated in the shooting. "The procedure of the Germans now seems to be the same everywhere—first of all they requisition food and drink of which they partake to the point of drunkenness. Then they begin to shoot wildly from the windows of the abandoned houses, declaring the inhabitants have fired on them. Then the firing and shooting scene begins, and murder and especially pillage and acts of bold cruelty are witnessed, and neither age nor sex is respected. Even where they claim to know the perpetrator to the dead they allege, the Germans do not content themselves with executing summarily the culprit—they wreak their vengeance on the whole town. After a massacre, some what at random, they shut the men into the churches and order the women to go back to their homes and leave the door open.

The Day In Congress

Washington, Sept. 16.—House met at noon. Debate resumed on bill to codify the printing laws. Representative Mitchell of Massachusetts, elected member of the ways and means committee. Banking and currency committee heard Senator Hoke Smith's bill in favor of permitting state banks to issue emergency currency. Adjourned at 5:35 until noon Thursday. Senate met at 11 a. m. Filibuster against river and harbor bill continued. Recessed at 5:35 p. m., until noon Thursday.
