Boston September 21.—By defeating Pittsburgh, 6 to 5 today while New York lost to Chicago, the Braves took up their interrupted advance in the National league pennant race. The leaders advantage is now four full games.

Pittsburgh's defeat was accomplished by four runs made in the fourth inning. After Smith had singled in that inning, he took second on Maranville's sacrifice and third on Whaling's out at first. Rudolph sent Smith home on a single. Moran walked and Evers singled. With the bases filled Connolly tripled to center, and three more runs were scored.
