PAMPHLET PRINTED ABOUT THAT BODY

A FINE MEMBERSHIP

Senate Will Be Composed of Some of Best Politicians and Shrewdest Men in South Carolina

Marvin M. Mann, of St. Matthews, clerk of the senate, has compiled a roster of the senators who will be members of the general assembly which meets next January. The pamphlet gives the name and the address of each member. This is convenient in several ways, but especially in that it enables hold-over members to inquire into the abilities of the new senators and enables the latter to communicate with his colleagues in advance of the opening of the session. Senate committees are chosen in caucus of the hold-over members on the night before the regular session convenes. There is a popular but erroneous idea that senators are appointed to committees by the lieutenant governor, who is ex-officio president of the upper house.

ANDERSON HEARS OF A NEW COUNTY

'McDuffie County' May Be Formed in This State From Counties All Near Anderson

Since the announcement was made yesterday that a movement is on foot for the formation of a new county in South Carolina, Anderson people have been asking many questions and inquiring much interest in the proposition.

The idea is to form a new county from the present counties of Edgefield, Abbeville and Greenwood counties, with McCormick as the county seat, and to call it McDuffie county. The governor has appointed the following committee in re the new county: A. L. N. Chamberlain of McCormick, A. P. Gilbert of Abbeville, W. A. Chestnut of Troy, W. H. Brown of Greenwood, W. B. Parks and D. B. Hollingsworth of Edgefield.

CLEMSON TIGERS TO PLAY OPENER TODAY

EXPECT GOOD GAME WITH GEORGIA

FIRST OF SEASON

Anderson Boy Is Expected To Make Splendid Showing In Encounter at Clemson Today

Numbers of Anderson people will journey to Clemson today to witness the opening game of the Clemson Tigers season. The exhibition will probably be rather slow, because of the fact that neither Clemson nor Daltonville will be in "fit" shape since there has been only three or four practices. Again, the weather this afternoon will be rather too warm for real fast work with the pigskin, but nevertheless the lovers of the sport say that they are expecting a good exhibition.

The Georgia visitors are said to have a good team and it is believed that they will show up almost as well as Clemson because that institution opened a few weeks earlier than did Clemson and the football squads has therefore been able to get in more time at practice.

If the Tigers do not annex a string of victories this season longer, and more brilliant than for half a dozen years there will be disappointment in the camp. There are more men trying for the team than ever before, being at least seven full elevens with a few surplus men hanging on the edge of each out at regular practice every afternoon. There are 17 old men from last year's squad working out regularly, with about as many likely candidates from the class teams. There are some promising men in the Freshman class, too, but according to the new S. I. A. A. rules, Clemson cannot play freshmen.

Clemson is well manned so far as coaches are concerned. Bob Williams needs no introduction to football fans in the South. He has never turned out a poor team, and he has many a time upset all the odds. He is working harder than ever at Clemson this year, and he is ably assisted by J. L. Carson and Hop Ganley, both of last year's team. These men with the assistance of several of the leading old players, keep all the squads going at a lively clip.

Northern Firms Plan to Buy Ten Bales of Cotton in South Carolina, One out of Anderson

I will certainly want a bale of Anderson county cotton and will advise you in a few days to buy it for us."
