The Day In Congress. Washington, Sept. 26.—Senate met at noon. Resumed consideration of the Alaska coal and land leasing bill. Passed substitute for Alaska coal and leasing bill restricting leases to American citizens. Adjourned at 3:50 p. m. to noon Monday. House met at noon. Referred the substitute Rivers and Harbors bill to a committee. Indefinitely postponed action on radium conservation bill. Debated a rule giving right of way immediately to the Philippine independence bill. Adopted special rule for consideration of Jones Philippine bill, limiting general debate to 12 hours but allowing limitation on amendments. Adjourned at 3:50 to noon Monday.
