JEWISH FESTIVAL IS BEING CELEBRATED

HOLIEST DAY IN THE JEWISH CALENDAR

IT IS YUM KIPPER

"Day of Atonement" Among Most Solemn of Jewish Days, Is Observed in Anderson

Members of the Jewish race in Anderson have been engaged since yesterday afternoon in celebrating what is probably the holiest day in the Jewish calendar, the "Day of Atonement" or Yum Kipper. The services began yesterday and will continue throughout today.

The festival is ordained in Leviticus 16:29-34 and 23:26-32. In both passages it is styled "A Sabbath of Solemn Rest."

The purposes of the Day of Atonement is clearly indicated by its name. It is intended to complete and crown the work of the penitential season, begun on the first of Tishri (New Year), by finally reconciling the soul with the Almighty.

It is kept, too, as a fast, in obedience to the command given in each of the two passages above cited, where the expression "afflict the soul" must be understood, as it is throughout the Bible, as synonymous with fasting.

The chief, the real aim of the Day of Atonement is the reformed life. All the external elements of the day's observance—its worship and austerities are intended to promote this supreme purpose. They can not do duty for it.

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WITH THE LIVE STOCK.

The age of an animal has much to do with the gain secured, and other things being equal, a young growing animal will make a greater gain from a bushel of corn or a given amount of food than one near maturity.

A young and growing colt requires something more than mere filling. It must have nutritious, tissue building and blood making food.

FEEDING THE COLT FOR DEVELOPMENT

[Prepared by United States department of agriculture.]

A question similar to the following is sometimes propounded by farmers who have not had much experience in raising colts: "Will a colt which is properly fed and cared for make a larger and better horse than one that is fed on corn and stover through its first winter; or will he just make himself more quickly in the former case?"

It would be well for all farmers who are now producing or who intend to produce in the future one or more colts each season to ponder on the above question. It may be the idea of some men that a colt will make a good horse whether he be fed well or left to shift for himself as best he can, provided he be allowed sufficient time in the making.

After the young colt begins to investigate his mother's feed box at feeding time he should be provided with a

box of his own and fed separately about all the ground oats and corn he wants twice a day. But it is usually after he is weaned, at a time when he can best utilize a liberal grain ration, that he fares the hardest.

Slugs For Steers.
