THE COMPRISE COTTON RELIEF PLAN DEFEATED

Southern Members of the House Fought Strenuously, But in Vain for the Bill.

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.—The compromise cotton relief plan, proposed by Southern congressmen to relieve the situation resulting from the decreased European demand for cotton on account of the continental war, was defeated in the house today, 123 to 91.

The cotton relief supporters succeeded in getting aside the calendar Wednesday rule under which consideration of the cotton plan would have been prevented for the day. Representative Henry moved to close all debate on the special rule brought in for the consideration of the Lever cotton warehouse bill, the Glass bill authorizing the issue of federal reserve notes on 100 per cent. commercial paper, and the cotton relief compromise.
