#### ELECTRIC CITY SPARKLETS

Items of Interest and Personal Mention Caught Over the Wireless on the Streets of Anderson

**Mr. Felton Will Move to Town.**  
J. B. Felton, county superintendent of education, is making arrangements to move to Anderson and at an early date will bring his family into the city. Mr. Felton has not yet decided where he will live but it is probable that he will locate in North Anderson. In discussing the matter yesterday Mr. Felton said that he was moving from his farm in the Flat Rock section because of his children. He intends placing them in the Anderson schools.

**No Typhoid Fever Here Last Month.**  
According to the report of the South Carolina Board of Health for the month of September, made public yesterday, there was not a single case of typhoid fever reported from Anderson county during that month. All told, 297 cases of diphtheria were reported from all parts of the State during September and of this number 24 cases were in this county. There are always more cases of diphtheria in this State during the months of September and October than at any other time of the year and the number for this county is not alarming by any means.

**Williamston Man Bought New Car.**  
E. W. Gregory of Williamston came to Anderson yesterday on business and while here registered a new automobile, a five-passenger Franklin touring car. Mr. Gregory says that his new machine is a beauty and that he is well pleased with it. His number being Anderson county's total up to 621.

**High School Idea For the Schools.**  
J. B. Felton, county superintendent of education, has an excellent idea for the schools of South Carolina, which may eventually be worked out and put into operation in this State. Mr. Felton believes that a mutual insurance association can be organized for South Carolina schools by which every county school in the State can pay its proportionate share when any school building is burned. Mr. Felton has estimated that this will lower the cost of insurance on every building in the State employed for school purposes and that no school will have to pay more than one-third as much as is now expended for insurance in this State. He also anticipates insuring every building for its total instead of

Following the fire, a small purse was made up for Mr. Whitfield.

Among the interested Andersonians attending the Belton Fair yesterday was Porter A. Whaley, secretary of the Anderson Chamber of Commerce. In talking to a reporter for the Intelligencer concerning the Fair, Mr. Whaley said that he liked everything he saw in Belton and he felt as though the Belton people should be commended for what they have been able to accomplish in the way of working up a one-day fair.
