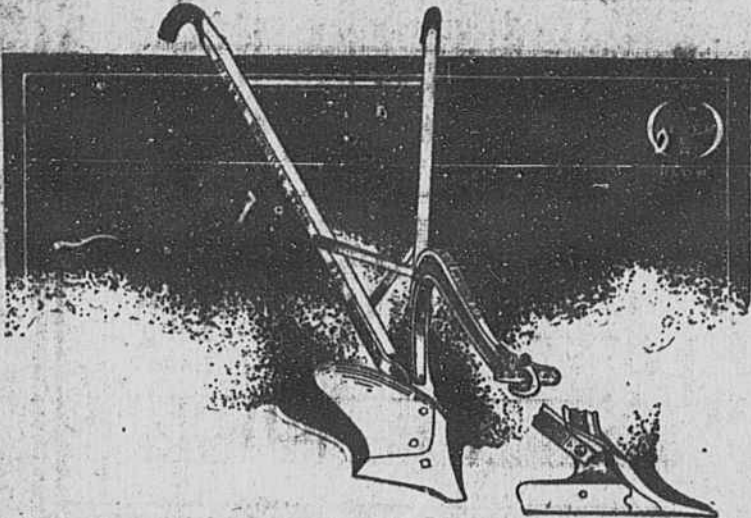

NOTICE OF COUNTY TREASURER

The books of the County Treasurer will be opened for the collection of State, County and School taxes for the Fiscal Year 1914, and Commutation Road tax for the year 1915 at the County Treasurer's office from October 15th to December 31st, 1914. After December 31st, one per cent penalty will be added; and after February 28th, seven per cent penalty will be added, till the 15th day of March, 1915, when the books will be closed. All persons owning property in more than one township or school district are requested to call for receipts in EACH TOWNSHIP OR SCHOOL DISTRICT, in which the property is located. On account of having so many school districts this request is very important to the taxpayers and will to a large extent eliminate extra costs and penalties.

FULL ATTENDANCE FIGURES

Clemson Now Has 61 More Full-Year Students Than All Last Year. CLEMSON COLLEGE, Oct. — Complete enrollment figures issued by President W. J. Riggs at the end of the first month of work at Clemson College develops the remarkable fact that during the past year the college has already enrolled 61 more full-year college students than in all of last session and that the enrollment is so large as to strain the limits of the institution's capacity. Dr. Riggs makes the following statement: "The session opened with the return of our students out of a possible attendance at the close of last session, after deducting from those who graduated and finished the one-year course, and 13 not eligible to return. The new students number 352, making a total of 314. This total represents more in the full-year course than ever before in the history of the college. Last session the total enrollment was 218, this number including forty-seven preparatory students and eighteen one-month agricultural men. It will be seen from this statement that we have already enrolled 61 more full-year college students than during all of last session."

LAWRENCE WELBORNE DEAD

Young Man Aged 18, Succumbed of Typhoid Fever. Lawrence Welborne died Sunday at 10:30 a. m. at his home of his father, six miles north of the city. He had suffered some four or five weeks with typhoid fever. He was 19 years old and lived a Christian life throughout. He was a splendid young man, a staunch friend and a pleasing neighbor. Funeral services were conducted by his pastor, Rev. H. C. Martin, Monday afternoon, after which the remains were laid to rest at Welcome church.

WAR WAS WAGED ON CITY'S SOCIAL CLUBS

ATLANTA SLEUTH DELIVERED GOODS WHOLESALE RAID Dixie Club and Owl Club Felt Strong Right Arm of Law, Others Also Arranged.

If the German artillery had hit town and shelled certain of the city's social clubs Sunday night no more interest could have been aroused over the city than was evinced yesterday morning when it was found that the Anderson police force, headed by Detective Wiggins from the Thiel agency of Atlanta, had made an onslaught on the Dixie Social club on Whittier street, said to be owned and operated by J. E. Derrick and on the Owl's club on south Main street, said to be owned and controlled by Lewis Myers. Both these places were raided and their goods confiscated, while two other arrests were made on the charge of selling whiskey and violating the liquor laws.

SEIZED BEVERAGES IN FREIGHT OFFICES

Determined that they would make a clean sweep of everything in sight, since they had made such a good start, the city officials yesterday instructed Chief of Police Sammons to visit every railroad station in town and seize whatever beer or liquor they might have on hand, consigned to either the Owl or Dixie club or in care of the proprietor of either place. The chief of police in turn instructed Police Captain Bell to take the work in hand and Capt. Bell, with several patrolmen visited each of the stations. A call was first made to the Blue Ridge railroad, the C. & N. line and C. C. came next and the P. & N. line third. In each instance the railroad authorities refused to give up the spirits and beverages and the police returned for a consultation with the city attorneys. Meanwhile the railroads had gotten in touch with their attorneys and were advised to refuse surrender of the goods. The police came again and again they were notified not to touch the shipments but acting this time on the advice of the city attorneys the beer and whiskey was seized. All told 17 barrels of beer and two cases of liquor were taken in charge by the police and carried to the city jail. The question presented here is a pretty one from a legal standpoint. The liquor houses will straightway enter suit against the railroad because the railroad lines did not deliver the shipments to the consignee and return it in violation of the railroads will enter suit against the city of Anderson for instructing its policemen to seize shipments after the police had been warned not to do so by the railroad authorities. It was known last night that at least one railroad was in communication with its consignees in an attempt to determine what steps might be taken and it is presumed that all of the lines will follow practically the same course. The shipments seized yesterday, while addressed to several different parties, were all in care of either the proprietors of one of the social clubs or in care of the club itself. Certain it is that many visitors would have been heartily delighted to spend a few hours in the city hall last night had the opportunity been granted them.

PROF. DANIEL OPENS COURSE

FIRST SPEAKER FOR Y. M. C. A. COURSE AT ORR MILL. THE FIGHTING MAN Subject Aibly Presented in Forceful Address Before Large Audience Sunday.

One of the most helpful and "meaty" addresses heard in a long while in Anderson, was the address given Sunday afternoon by Prof. D. W. Daniel, of Clemson college, at Orr mill's hall, under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A. This address was the first of a series of meetings to be held at this place during the winter, and was attended by at least five hundred persons. After a song service in which many old familiar songs were sung with great zest, Mr. D. H. Mims, extension field worker of the local Y. M. C. A., called upon Rev. Belvin, pastor of the Methodist church, to open with prayer the series of meetings Mr. Mims then introduced Mr. J. B. Humber, secretary of the Orr mill, who introduced the speaker. The subject chosen by Prof. Daniel was "The Fighting Man." After a few well chosen anecdotes, which put the audience in a receptive frame of mind, the speaker proceeded to drive home some valuable thought as to what constituted the things for which a man should fight. The speaker was noted for his ability to fight with his hands and feet, and the strongest man physically was the hero of the tribe. There is still admiration for a strong man physically, and it is natural for one to feel that he can take his part in a personal combat. One admires the qualities of the soldier who bravely fights for a principle, and the South is richer and better for the struggle between the sections during the late war. A great heritage was left the Southland by Lee and Jackson, and every man in the South is a better man because he feels that he is related to those great chieftains in that we are from the same section. Figures were given to show the great numbers now engaged in the European war, and this was taken by the speaker to signify that fighting is still popular. "Tell me what a man will fight for," declared the speaker, "and I will tell you the kind of man he is." To be a good fighter it is necessary for a man to have a good physical make up, and those things which thwart the growth of a boy should not be used. Prof. Daniel was especially severe on the cigarette habit, which he said dwarfed the body and the mind of the boy who thought it manly to use them. "Before this war," said the speaker, "it was found by the chemists that the actual value of a man who weighed 150 pounds, according to the physical value of the material in a man, is only \$5.50." He then went on to show that the mind of man properly cultivated was worth, and how much it increased the value of the man in his community. He urged the young men in the audience to attend night school, if they are forced to work in the day time, and to strive to cultivate the mind. At the conclusion of Prof. Daniel's address he was congratulated by many of the audience. The meeting closed with prayer by Rev. Stone, pastor of the Orville Baptist church. Next Sunday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock, Prof. John G. Chinkoos, of Wofford college, will address a similar meeting at the same place. He will be followed by Hon. Jos. A. McCullough, of Greenville the third Sunday in November; Dr. E. M. Post of Greenville the fourth Sunday.
