### SPLENDID SERVICES AT BAPTIST CHURCH

DR. WHITE IS DELIVERING POWERFUL SERMONS

### 50 JOINED CHURCH

Effect of Services Is Being Felt Throughout the Entire City.

Two splendid services were held yesterday at the First Baptist church where the revival services by Rev. John E. White of Atlanta is being conducted each day. In the morning at 10 o'clock Dr. White spoke to a good congregation on the subject, "What is a Christian For." Dr. White presents his theme in a clear interesting way that holds his hearers from the first word. Besides an attractive delivery he possesses a personal magnetism that wins its way straight to the heart of his hearers.

Last night another unusually large congregation gathered for the evening services and after reading the 11th chapter of Isaiah, Dr. White spoke from the latter part of the 6th verse: "And a little child shall lead them," his subject for the evening being, "For the Children's Sake." He went back to the old Hebrew prophets who, taught of the Golden Age to come. Others had taught that there had been already a better time, but the prophets taught that the great kingdom of God was before us. This 11th chapter of Isaiah gives Isaiah's view of the golden age. Wild animals mixing with domestic animals, the lion's nature will go out of the lion and the devil out of lower nature, for sin afflicts not only man but the animal nature; in the bliss of the serpent and the roar of the lion.

Wild animals are dying out and the peaceful domestic animals increasing. Nature itself is pictured as yielding to the power of God and God is going to bring peace and harmony to earth. The chief thought here is that among the wild animals a little child will dominate and rule. The civiliza-

tion that learns how to solve the problem of childhood is the one that will solve the world problem.

A generation ago things were done for the adult, today everything is being done for the child. Jesus not only emancipates womanhood, but childhood. Values in a child: 1st. Economic value—Not a burden but an asset. The child has a claim upon your services, your best of everything.

2nd. Great moral value. Beyond price to the mother. A previous gift of God. Parenthood makes people more accessible to God.

It is children and their innocence that keeps the world fit to live in. The child is the mainspring of our energy and our business men work because they have children to feed. The child also helps to preserve the unity of the home. The large majority of divorces are in childless homes.

Already over 50 have joined the church as the result of this meeting, and the effect of the services are being felt throughout the town.

The services today will be this morning at 10 o'clock, subject, "The Set of the Soul." Tonight, "The Unpardonable Sin."

### STEAMER SUNK

Twenty or Thirty Persons Drowned While Transferring Owing to Panic.

(By Associated Press.) DOVER, VIA LONDON, Oct. 26.—(10:26 p. m.)—The steamer Admiral Ganteaume was sunk today by a mine just outside Boulogne harbor. Twenty or thirty persons were drowned, owing to the panic which prevailed as the passengers were being transferred to the cross-channel steamer Queen, which rushed to the assistance of the sinking vessel.

Most of the passengers were peasants from Pas de Calais, who had been taken aboard at Calais to be transferred to Boulogne.

### Snow at Raleigh.

RALEIGH, N. C., Oct. 27.—Light snow began falling in Raleigh at 1 o'clock this morning, accompanying a decided drop in temperature. The fall was not heavy enough to remain on the ground.

## All Farmers Profiting Except Cotton Growers

SECRETARY OF AGRICULTURE HOUSTON SAYS THE SOUTHERN FARMER SHOULD LEARN FROM THEIR PRE-DICAMENT TO DIVERSIFY THEIR CROPS

(By Associated Press.) CHICAGO, Oct. 26.—Secretary of Agriculture Houston, who today addressed the convention of the National Dairy Show association, declared that all farmers were profiting by war prices except the Southern Cotton growers. He expressed the opinion that the cotton growers should learn from their predicament to diversify their crops.

"With people of all sections keenly interested in the supply of life necessities, they recognize the supreme importance of making agriculture efficient and profitable and rural life comfortable," Secretary Houston told the convention. He described what the government was doing to aid the farmer to increase the nation's rapidly diminishing meat supply, develop acreage production and declare there could be "no question that the solution of many of the problems of rural life will be found in some form of concerted action or cooperation."

"Unquestionably," said the secretary, "that the largest hope for a considerable increase in our meat supply lies in three directions: "First—In sympathetic attention to the production of larger animals to the settled farming areas of the country, especially in the South.

"Second—In increasing attention to the smaller animals, such as swine and poultry, and "Third—In the control and eradication of cattle ticks and hog cholera.

"The last census shows a lamentable neglect of live stock in the South. While the average of Iowa farm has six milk cows in North Carolina and Alabama it has less than two and in South Carolina one.

No Southern State is giving the requisite attention either to the production of foodstuffs for human beings or for live stock."

The problems of marketing and distribution, he said, were even more urgent.

## MAKRET REPORT

Dry Goods

### New York Cotton

NEW YORK, Oct. 26.—Cotton goods were steady today. Yarns ruled quiet. A large carpet auction opened actively with the attendance large and prices well up to expectation.

More inquiry was reported for wool products for export.

NEW YORK, Oct. 26.—There was a larger attendance on the floor of the cotton exchange here today and sentiment seemed more optimistic.

The census report showing 7,610,682 bales ginned to October 18, comparing with 7,758,621 bales in 1911 bumper crop, was considered in line with larger estimates of the crop.

Announcement that Great Britain had declared cotton non-contraband of war and would not interfere with cotton shipments in neutral bottoms, made a favorable impression. It also was anticipated that plans for financing surplus supplies in the South would help the situation within the next few weeks.

Local spot handlers reported no immediate improvement in demand but said their offers from the southwest were from 1-16 to 1-8 higher.

New Orleans spots firm 6 1-2; sales 600.

### Liverpool Cotton

LIVERPOOL, Oct. 26.—Cotton, spot, good inquiry for both new and old crop. Sales 2,900 bales, including 2-10 American, on the basis of 5.05 for netting imports 9,527 bales, including 2 1/2 American.

### New Orleans Cotton

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 26.—For the first time in weeks the local spot market today was quoted firm. Prices were not changed, middling standing at 6 1-2 cents. In the future market January was steady at 7.05, and advance of five points over last prices Saturday.

The market had a better tone all around on the announcement that the English government would not stand in the way of insurance companies accepting war risks on cotton and on reports indicating that the future markets probably would be reopened early in November.

Exports for the day amounted to 18,500 bales, cotton clearing from United States ports for ports in Sweden, Spain, England and Mexico. Spot cotton firm, sales on the spot 230; to arrive 370.

### Cotton Seed Oil

NEW YORK, Oct. 26.—Cotton seed oil developed further weakness today under general liquidation and hedge pressure, the result of declining crude markets and continued dullness in outside trade. Final prices were 10 to 22 points net lower.

Prime crude 3.60; prime summer yellow 4.60; October 4.60; November 4.60; December 4.60; January 4.81; February 4.90; March 5.12; April 5.18; May 5.36. Prime winter yellow and summer white 5.00.

The market closed weak. Spot 4.60 @ 4.80; October 4.60 @ 4.75; November 4.60 @ 4.92; March 5.12 @ 5.13; April 5.15 @ 5.20; May 5.36 @ 5.37. Total sales 18,300.

### Chicago Grain

CHICAGO, Oct. 26.—Accumulating supplies put wheat today under much selling pressure. The close was steady at a decline of 5-8 to 3-4 cents. Corn finished 5-8 @ 3-4 to 1 @ 1-8 down, oats off 3-8 to 3-8 @ 1-3 and provisions varying from a loss of 30 cents to 20 cents advance.

## SECOND DISASTROUS FIRE IN ONE NIGHT

CATO STREET HOME WAS BURNED

FAMILY'S ESCAPE

J. A. Russell and Wife and Children Barely Managed to Save Lives.

The second disastrous fire for one night came in Anderson at 11:30 o'clock when a call was sent in yesterday from Cato street for the fire department. The home of J. A. Russell at 113 Cato street and barely off Main street, caught in some unknown manner and Mr. Russell and his wife and babies barely managed to get out of the burning building with their lives.

One of Mr. Russell's children had been sick last night and during the early hours of the evening a fire had been kept in one of the guest rooms of the place. The family retired and when Mr. Russell awoke he found that the roof was almost ready to fall in. He managed to get his family aroused and in trying to aid them to escape he jumped through a window and suffered a very painful cut on his left arm. The wound bled profusely and it was necessary to take the injured man to a physician for medical attention.

Some few articles of household furniture were saved from the fire but practically everything was lost. Mr. Russell states that he carried \$500 on his furniture but that this was not a fraction of its real worth. The house was the property of Rev. G. M. Dagers and while it could not be ascertained what sum of insurance was carried, it was said that Mr. Russell's loss was protected.

When the fire department arrived last night it did valiant service and prevented the flames from spreading to nearby buildings but there was absolutely no chance of being able to save the burning structure, since it was doomed before an alarm was ever turned in.

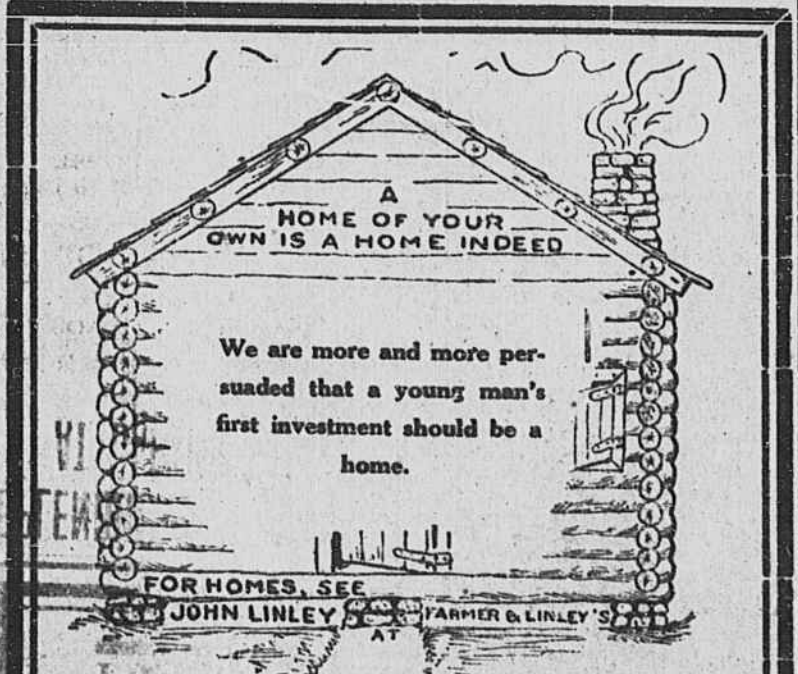
