Everything In Readiness For Opening of Piedmont Fair

AEROPLANE FLIGHT IN MORNING; RACES IN THE AFTER-NOON—EXHIBITS WILL BE LARGER AND BETTER THAN EVER

GREENWOOD, Oct. 25.—With prospects for the very best of weather, with more exhibits of every class than have been expected by the officials, with all plans made for trotting races on today and Thursday, with an aviator on the ground to make two flights daily from the fair grounds, the first Piedmont Fair is ready to throw open its gates to the public Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock.

Aviator Here. Of first importance to hundreds of people will be the aviation flights morning and afternoon during the three days and they will be interested to know that Aviator Joseph Richter with his mechanic Frank Frey, arrived in the city this morning from Harrisonburg, Va., where they exhibited last week. The machine will arrive Tuesday night over the Seaboard Air Line and will be taken immediately to the fair grounds where it will be assembled for the first flight Wednesday morning which takes place at 10:30.

Will Circle City. Aviator Richter is an experient flyer, having been a birdman since the Curtis biplanes created big sensations several years ago. He promises to do the "Spiral Dip" and the "Ocean Wave" in addition to the high ascensions on each day. The flights will be made from the fair grounds. He will rise a distance of from 1,200 to 1,500 feet over 12 times the height of the standpipe, will circle the city and then alight at the grounds. Those who wish to see the flights to best advantage, both starting and alighting, are urged to be at the grounds at the hours when the ascensions will be made.

Two Flights Daily. There will be two flights daily by Aviator Richter at hours to be found in the official program as follows: Wednesday morning at 10:30; Wednesday afternoon at 2; Thursday morning at 10:30; Thursday afternoon at 2:15; Friday morning at

11:45 and Friday afternoon at 2. The gates will open at 10 o'clock giving the crowds time to hear the band concert and get a view of the biplane before the first flight. After the flight, at 11 o'clock horses and mules will be judged, until the noon hour. In the afternoon, on Wednesday, aside from another flight will be trotting races beginning at 4:20 and closing at 5:20.

Livestock Day. Thursday will be Livestock Day when some of the finest animals will be shown and judged. Thursday afternoon there will be three more races.

College Girls Coming. An evidence of the interest that is being taken in the Piedmont Fair it is announced that 100 young ladies of the Woman's college at Due West will be present on Friday, Educational Day, when the fair will be turned over to the schools and colleges. Dr. Robinson, president of the Due West College, notified Prof. Nickles yesterday afternoon that the girls would arrive at 11 o'clock and spend the day here visiting the fair and shopping. Arrangements are being made now for the entertainment of these visitors.

Show Dope

Electric Theatre is to Be Closed and Bijou Theatre Will Be Considerably Larger.

Anderson people will learn with considerable interest that the Electric theatre, located on north Main street and owned and operated by Bristow and McCullough, is to be closed next Monday and the theatre dismantled. The handsome opera chairs, with which this theatre is equipped will be moved to the Bijou theatre where the stage will be cut down and space made for them.
