OFFICIAL WAR STATEMENTS

(By Associated Press.)
 BERLIN, Via Amsterdam and London, 8:15 p. m., Oct. 27.—General headquarters under date of October 27 announced:
 "The battle on the Yser canal near Ypres and southwest from Lille is proceeding with the same stubbornness. Yesterday the German troops made progress.
 "On the other battle front in the western theatre no important events have occurred.
 "To the west of Augustowo the German attack is slowly proceeding. To the southwest of Warsaw our troops have repulsed all the attacks of strong Russian forces. North of Ivanogrod, a new Russian army corps has crossed the Vistula."

 PARIS, Oct. 27.—(11:10 p. m.)—A very brief official statement was issued tonight by the French war office regarding the great battle which is in progress in Belgium and northern France. The text follows:
 "There is nothing to report except some progress on our part in the region to the south of Dixmude."
 PARIS, Oct. 27.—(2:44 p. m.)—The French official announcement given this afternoon says that "spirited fighting continues between the mouth of the Yser and Lens; that in this district the Allies have not drawn back, and that they have continued to advance in the region between Ypres and Roulers and elsewhere."

MUSIC FESTIVAL WILL BE BIG EVENT HERE

NOTED STARS HAVE BEEN SECURED

ALL ARE ARTISTS

Complete Announcements About Attraction in February Are Free of Promises.

Arrangements have been closed for the presentation in this city next February of a musical festival at Anderson Theatre, which cannot but prove the social and the intellectual event of the year.

The Festival will run for three days with afternoon and evening sessions. Noted artists of international reputation will make up the program. The event must not be confused with a lyceum course or a chautauqua although the arrangement of presentation is somewhat on the order of the latter.

One of the world's famous violinists will be here with his associate artists. A company of vocalists and instrumentalists just returned to America from foreign tour will participate. One of America's celebrated coloratura sopranos, assisted by an eminent pianist will give recitals. The musical attractions appear on different days.

The dramatic features will be carried out by two of the greatest artists in their line in the United States. In addition to the music and dramatic features, each afternoon a lecturer of high ability will speak. In short the Festival will be made up of music, drama, and oratory, by stars of the American and European platform.

Space will not permit at this writing to go into detail on the several artists to appear, but due and full announcement will be given from time to time, covering the work and the achievements of each artist to take part in the program.

Dr. George Seldon Waldo, who is directing the Southern tours of the artists, expresses himself on the merits of the talent in the highest praise. "I know of no event ever presented in the Southern States, of greater strength of merit. When the festival of the coming winter is passed and gone I feel that its worth and good effect will be so keenly felt by this community that arrangements will be made for its return the following year."

"Unfortunately our Southern country has been so overrun in recent years with trashy entertainments that we often find it difficult to convince the people in advance of the calibre and ability of the artists we are bringing into the Southland on the artist festivals. The first night usually convinces them, however, and the good word spreads.

"In bringing the event before the people of this community, we want them to fully realize that something truly big is to be presented, although it is not the plan of the local committee to charge more than a very nominal price for their season ticket. "We want the public to appreciate the strength of each artist on the program, so from time to time full information will be given out in regard to them."

LETTER DEPICTS THE CONDITIONS ABROAD

ANDERSON MAN HEARD FROM HOME

BROTHERS IN WAR

Communication to Martin Seligman Says That Soldiers Are All Treated Fine.

Mr. Martin Seligman, of the Lesser Co., is in receipt of a letter, dated Oct. 1, but just received this week, from his mother who lives in Berlin, Germany, stating that there are now 500,000 prisoners each of Russians and French in Berlin, and that the people give them cigarettes, cigars and delicacies of one sort and another from day to day. On Sundays particularly, the people go out to the camps of detention, where the prisoners of war are detained, and carry them little presents.

Mr. Seligman has two brothers, aged 49 and 55, who were summoned to the colors at the outbreak of hostilities for two weeks service, at the expiration of which time they returned to civil life; they are, however, subject to the call of their emperor at any moment, but Mr. Seligman's advice from home is that they don't yet need the older men, nor the students. Mr. Seligman has a nephew who is a student in the University of Berlin, one of the most famous colleges of Medicine in the entire world, who was summoned to the colors at the beginning of the war for three weeks service, but who was returned to his college at the end of this short time, with the understanding that if his country needs him, he would be called.

This famous college, with many others was closed at the outbreak of this war, but by order of the Emperor, they resumed teaching on Oct. 1st. Mr. Seligman states that every letter from home states that all classes of people are enthusiastic over the war and its final outcome; that there is no doubt in the minds of the people there that Germany's ability to fight this war out to a successful conclusion.

One of Mr. Seligman's brothers, mentioned above fought in the Spanish war for the United States, and in the war between Great Britain and the Boers. He went to South Africa and fought for the Boers. He seems to be a soldier of fortune.

Mr. Seligman says that his advices from Germany are that Germany has several lines of reserves of one sort and another, men over forty-five years and students under eighteen years of age, which have not yet been called to the colors, and that Germany is in the very best condition possible to carry on this war.

Committee

T. Frank Watkins Has Gone to Columbia to Attend Important Meeting of Democrats.

T. Frank Watkins, a member of the Anderson bar and a member of a sub-committee of the State Democratic executive committee, left last night for Columbia where he will today attend a meeting of the sub-committee. This committee has in hand the work of going over and revising the rules of the Democratic party, governing elections in this State.

When seen last night Mr. Watkins told a reporter for The Intelligencer that he had nothing definite in mind to suggest himself, in regard to changes, but that certain members of the committee have on foot a move to eliminate from the rules a clause which says that if a candidate for any State or National office withdraws from the race in less than 20 days before the election, there shall be no election. He says that a number of the committeemen seem to favor the elimination of this clause and that people all over the State seem to be in favor of the change.

Burned

Little Girl Lost Her Life When She Fell Into the Fire and Sustained Injuries.

While the children of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Fitchey were playing around the room yesterday afternoon, shortly after two o'clock, little Selma Estelle, fell into the open fire place and was terribly burned before her horrified parents could snatch her from the body from the flames. The little girl had managed to swallow some of the fire, which burned her internally and in addition to this she was burned from head to foot. Medical assistance was promptly summoned and the attending physicians did everything they could to save the little girl but the end came at 5:30 o'clock last evening.

The family live about 2-1/2 miles east of Anderson and the entire community feels deeply for them in their great loss.

The funeral services are to take place today at 3 o'clock at the Eureka church.

and Roulers, where there has been some of the sternest fighting of this sanguinary battle, and where the British Indian troops have made their first appearance in the firing line. The opposing forces are so strong that it must be many days before a decisive result is attained by either side, despite great losses they are suffering.

Along the old front, stretching from the river Oise to the Meuse, from which the Germans withdrew their best troops to strengthen the army attempting to advance along the coast the French have been taking the offensive, and north of Soissons have been engaged in an artillery duel with the Germans in which they have destroyed several German batteries. They seem to have been at this for some time, for the last three reports from Paris have announced the destruction of German guns.

Farther east the French have driven the Germans, who were threatening Nancy, back across the frontier. The Germans, however, are so strongly entrenched along this long line that it is believed they are preparing to remain for the winter.

Serious battles are proceeding in Southern Poland and in Galicia, with

at decisive results. The Russians have crossed the Vistula north of vanguard with fresh army corps, which should have a marked effect on the fortunes of the battle. From their own account they appear to be breaking down Austrian resistance south of Przemysl and throughout Galicia, where stubborn fighting has been going on for weeks.

Another phase of rebellion has broken out in South Africa—this time headed by Generals Christian De Wet and Beyers. Neither of these men has any considerable following, but it is feared lurchers, who like themselves, retain some of the bitterness aroused by the South African war, will join force with them.

The defense force, as the army of the Union of South Africa is called, is considered for the government, for when General Beyers gave up his command of that force on the outbreak of war none of the officers or men of the army followed him. General Botha, the premier, retains his support of the great mass of the people of the Union.

German mine layers have mined the waters north of Ireland, the first victim of which was the British steamer Manchester Commerce.
