OFFICIAL STATEMENTS

(By Associated Press.) BERLIN, Oct. 31.—(Via Amsterdam and London, 7:07 p. m.)—A report received here today from German headquarters says:

"Our army in Belgium yesterday occupied Ramskapelle (21-2 miles east of Nieuport) and Preschoon and attacks on Ypres are progressing."

"The battle in the northeastern theatre till now has not been decided. To the west of Warsaw the Russians are slowly following our troops which are now being grouped."

HAVRE, Oct. 31.—(Via London 8:45 p. m.)—An official dispatch from the Belgian army headquarters to the Belgian minister of war says:

"Fierce attacks were attempted yesterday morning by the enemy in the neighborhood of Ramskapelle and Pervyse. The second of these attacks was repulsed with great loss."

PETROGRAD, Oct. 31.—The following official communication was issued by general headquarters tonight:

"On the East Prussian front the plan for breaking through the center of our fortified position around Bakalzewo projected by the enemy has failed. During five days of unsuccessful attacks the Germans suffered immense losses."

LONDON, Nov. 1.—(1:15 a. m.)—The following German official statement has been received from Berlin by Marconi wireless:

"The tension between the Chinese and Japanese troops is extremely great. Japan has advised the president of China that Japanese warships will suppress the revolutionary movement in Shan-Tung province."

PARIS, Oct. 31.—(11 p. m.)—No official communication issued tonight by the French war office says:

"According to the latest advices there is no incident of any importance to report. In the center we have made progress in the region to the north of Soissons."

LONDON, Oct. 31.—(5:53 a. m.)—An official message has been received at Rome from Constantinople, according to a dispatch to the Central News Agency...

IMPOSED FINE OF \$1,000 ON DERRICK

A startling culmination came in the liquor trials now going on in Anderson when J. E. Derrick, charged with operating a social club and selling intoxicating beverages, arose in open court, asked permission to withdraw his plea of not guilty in the four cases in which he had already been convicted, and to substitute a plea of guilty to the charges in all the 12 cases.

When court convened yesterday morning a jury was drawn to hear the fifth case against Derrick but before the hearing opened Mr. Derrick took the action stated above and this ended his trials.

It was generally presumed at the time that Derrick would pay his fines but after that time he was surrendered by his bondsmen to the city officials and was placed in jail at the city hall, seeming to indicate that he intends serving his time on the public works.

HE HAD A FINE TRIP.

J. B. Hall Writes of His Trip to New York City.

After going to Anderson I took the interurban to Greenwood, leaving on the 15th of August, arriving home on the 30th of the same. I landed in Washington on the 13th, taking a car to Baltimore. There I secured a ticket for ten days to New York. Then I put up in the Mills hotel, which is at Seventh avenue and Thirty-sixth street, New York. This hotel has 1,375 rooms. New York Mills hotel is conducted on hotel lines, and will be found a respectable, comfortable and low-priced home for men, transient or resident, to whom economy is an object. A large number have occupied rooms permanently from the first day of its opening. One person only is entitled to occupy rooms. Rooms must be vacated between 9 A. M. and 6 P. M. The management reserves the right to refuse money and exclude the holder of a ticket from the hotel at any time. This hotel is just barely a block of the city. No cursing nor swearing is allowed there. I went all the way to New York and back and heard none until I came back to Anderson. And I hope it will soon be stopped there. The next day was Sunday. All business was closed. I was at the wharf at the foot of Broadway. Thousands of people were there to go on excursions which were going in many directions. There was a great rush to get on board. While there I went into the fish show which is free to everybody. This was a grand sight to see. There were fish of all sizes. The underground railroad runs in all directions, night and day, and also the overhead cars. You can ride 15 miles for five cents. Policemen are standing at every crossing, sometimes the crossing is blocked. The Pennsylvania railroad runs under the New York postoffice and delivers the mail up in the center of the postoffice. The depot is near the center of New York, which is the finest depot I ever saw, said to be worth several million dollars, which I rode over the railroad on a boat ninety feet below the bottom of the river. I took a trip up the Hudson river 40 miles. The manager said that he had five thousand passengers on board that day. Music and dancing was carried on all the while. There was plenty to eat on the vessel. There is a park at the foot of the mountains which people visit. There is good cold water there and people put up tents and their homes are in New York. The people there are very clever, and go well dressed. I met a man by the name of Hall, who was there in a tent. He wanted me to stay while with him, but the boat did not stay but three hours. Landing here at night was a pretty sight for anyone to see. The teacher is given a golden opportunity of witnessing the most beautiful of Nature's handwork of seeing the boat and high mountains. The Hudson river is about one mile wide. You can see thousands of people in bathing in the Giant pool Sloop-park, Coney Island, N. Y. In going to Coney Island you have to cross the Brooklyn bridge, which is a mile and a half or two miles long. It has three car lines and two wagon or buggy roads. It is about 100 feet high or more and is made of steel. Brooklyn is a very large city, which you can get through on the cars. You can hardly get along on account of so many people. There are several other places of importance that I could mention but will not this time. From there I came here to Baltimore. There I went to the park and enjoyed the music and seeing the fireworks very much. From there I came to Washington on the car. There I was on the president's boat and heard some very pretty music also. I also visited other places which are very interesting. I came to Richmond and stayed one day and night where I stayed during the war in 1862. From Richmond I came on home. I could write much more than I have already written but I will close. J. B.
