Rise in Price Brought Cotton.
The advance in the price of cotton to 7 cents per pound brought farmers in from all parts of the county yesterday. While the additional one-quarter cent in price was a big consideration, still another reason for the increase in sales was the fact that many of the farmers had notes to pay, due on November 1. These two reasons combined served to bring more cotton to the local market yesterday than for any one day since the present season opened. The Pyrene company of South Carolina, C. C. Dargan, manager, yesterday purchased a bale of cotton at 10 cents per pound in accordance with instructions issued by Henry C. Futch, Southern manager of the company. In his letter of instruction to the local company, Mr. Futch says: "We are thus joining the great 'Buy-a-Bale' and giving material expression of our deeper sympathy for the Southern farmer in his hour of need." The manager of the Anderson company says that this movement will extend to Pyrene dealers in all the cotton growing States.

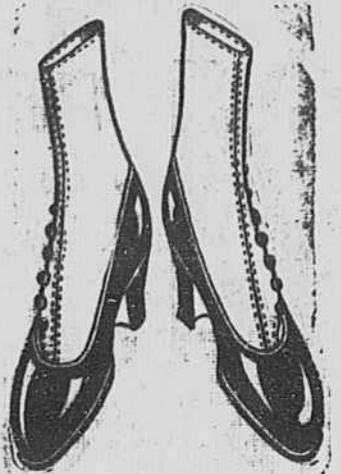
