Next Report Twice Daily. (By Associated Press.)

BERLIN, VIA ROME, Nov. 8.—(2:10 a. m.)—In addition to interning Englishmen of a military age the government has sharpened its measures against the nationals of other hostile countries. The latter must report twice daily to a police station and are not permitted to depart from their precinct nor to leave their houses between 8 o'clock at night and 7 o'clock in the morning.

Fire

Destroyed Three Negro Houses in North Anderson at Early Hour This Morning.

Three houses occupied by negroes were completely destroyed by fire in North Anderson this morning at 2:15 o'clock. When the fire department arrived on the scene, after a remarkably quick trip from town, the houses were falling in and there was no chance to save any one of the buildings. The best that the fire fighters could do was to protect adjacent property and this it did to such great advantage that there was no further loss of property.

It was impossible to ascertain the cause of the fire or the amount of loss, but it is understood that the negroes lost all of their household furniture and saved absolutely nothing.

The houses were situated on Daniels street and it is understood that at least two of them were owned by a negro. It is not thought that he carried any insurance.
