A new front will be put in the building and an up-to-date restaurant operated. The improvements will be started after January 1 and it is likely that the restaurant will be opened about the first of the following month.

Back Here After an Enlistment in Navy

J. M. Darracott, a native of the Strickland's Mill section of the county, is back in the city after an absence of several years. Mr. Darracott recently finished a five-year's enlistment in the United States navy. The only near relative he has in this county are two sisters, Miss Nellie Darracott, of the Anderson College, and Miss Maud Darracott, who is teaching at the Roberts school. Mr. Darracott left here several years ago and went to San Francisco, where he entered the naval training school. He was assigned to the cruiser Saratoga, which joined the Asiatic fleet. Mr. Darracott states that he saw fighting between Germans and Japanese around Tsing-Tau. He notes many changes in Anderson since leaving here.

Farm demonstration agent for Anderson county, J. W. Rothrock, is busy this week bringing to a close preparations for the Boys' Corn Club contest which is to be staged at the chamber of commerce Saturday. Expert judges are to be sent down from Clemson College to pass upon the merits of each exhibit. Several samples of corn for the show have been received at the chamber of commerce and others are expected to be brought in between now and Saturday. The show will begin at 12 o'clock Saturday and it is expected that it will be over shortly after the noon hour, as there will not be a great many exhibits to pass upon. The Anderson County Boys' Corn Club started out with a large membership, numbering some 50 or more, but for various reasons several dropped out. It is probable that there are not more than a dozen and a half or two dozen boys who will bring exhibits of corn to the show. An attractive prize list has been worked up for the contest, and those who are so fortunate as to win honors next Saturday will be presented with premiums that are worth while. The public is cordially invited to attend the show Saturday and view the exhibits of Anderson county corn.

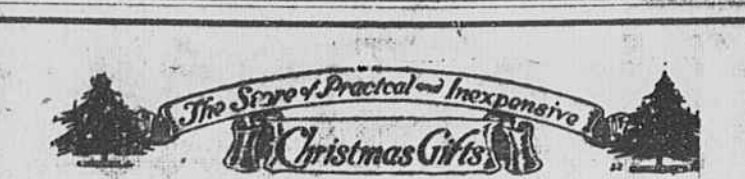

ASSESSMENT NOTICE

This office will be open to receive returns of personal property for taxation for the fiscal year from the first day of January, 1915, to the 20th of February following inclusive. All personal property must be returned. Real estate not returned this year but all transfers of real estate made since last returns should be noted upon the return blank when listing say on return to whom sold or from whom bought. The township board of assessors are required by law to list for all those that fail to make their own returns within the time prescribed, hence the difficulty of delinquents escaping the 25 per cent penalty, as well as the frequency of errors resulting from this practice by all assessors make your own return and thereby save expense, and trouble.
