OTHER MATTERS

Case of Milford Versus Geer Finished—Court Meets at 0:30 O'clock Today.

Shortly prior to the recessing of court of common pleas at 6 o'clock yesterday afternoon a compromise was reached in the matter of R. G. Owings, as administrator of the estate of John Owings, versus the Chiquola Manufacturing Company, the case being a suit for \$15,000 damages brought by the plaintiff against the mill at Honea Path as the result of fatal injuries received by his son, who worked in the plant as a sweeper and to stop cards for the card strippers. Attorneys interested in the matter were unwilling last night to make known the amount agreed upon in the settlement of the case.

Case Up Yesterday.

Trial in this case was begun yesterday morning at 10:30 o'clock, with Green & Earle, of this city, and H. P. Barbage, of Greenville, appearing as counsel for the plaintiff and Bonham, Watkins & Allen representing the defendant company. The plaintiff had taken all testimony from this side and the defense had put two or three witnesses upon the settlement was agreed upon.

Allegations in Case. The allegations in the suit charged, in substance, that the company was negligent and that as a result of this the boy sustained his fatal injuries. In the answer the defense denied these charges, stating that the boy's injuries were due to his own negligence.

Case Ended Yesterday.

When court met yesterday morning at 9:30 o'clock trial in the case of J. C. Milford versus L. V. Geer was resumed. This case was begun Tuesday. The plaintiff sought to recover possession of some 47 acres of land which the defendant contracted to buy. All testimony and arguments in the case were completed Tuesday afternoon, so when court met yesterday morning the delivery of the charge to the jury was in order. The jury was given several issues for their consideration, which were, with their answers, as follows: Question, "Is Geer tenant of Milford or is he in possession under contract to purchase?" Answer: "He is in possession under contract to purchase." Question: "If a purchaser, how much balance is due on purchase money?" Answer: "\$301.65."

ONLY BON-A-FIDE WAR PICTURE IS COMING

WILL BE SHOWN HERE FOR BENEFIT OF BELGIAN RELIEF FUND

THE PARAMOUNT

Will Have Its Formal Opening Next Saturday With This on Program.

Anderson people will shortly have the pleasure (it is called a pleasure) of viewing the first and only authentic European war motion picture in existence, for on next Saturday the Paramount theatre will exhibit for the benefit of the Belgian relief fund the celebrated picture "Oh Belgian Battlefields," which was taken by staff photographer of the Chicago Tribune. Saturday will mark the formal opening of this new motion picture theatre, and it is the plan of the management to give the proceeds of the forenoon performance to this worthy cause and 50 per cent of the afternoon and evening receipts. A scale of prices of 10 and 20 cents has been agreed upon for the forenoon show and 25 cents for the afternoon and evening performance. As a straight admission fee of 25 cents is charged wherever this wonderful picture is shown, the management of the theatre does not feel that the people of Anderson would object to these prices for admission, especially since the proceeds, or a large portion of the receipts, are to be given to the Belgian relief fund.

Opening Saturday.

Secretary Fred M. Burnett of the Y. M. C. A., who is looking after the interests of the Paramount theatre, returned Tuesday night from Atlanta, where he went to make the necessary arrangements for securing this European war picture. Mr. Burnett announced yesterday morning that the new motion picture theatre would open next Saturday morning.

At a meeting some days ago of the Chamber of Commerce committee which has charge of the movement to raise here a contribution to the Belgian relief fund it was announced that the Paramount theatre would put on an especially attractive program for the opening day of the house and give the forenoon receipts and half of the afternoon and evening receipts to the cause. The proposition was gladly accepted.

For School Children.

The understanding was that the attention of school children would be called to the special program and that they would be urged to attend a performance. The special price of 10 cents which will be charged for children Saturday morning is intended for them, as well as other children of the city. It was the idea of the committee that the forenoon would be given over to the children. Adults, of course, wishing to attend the forenoon performance will not be barred. But the afternoon and evening performances are intended for the grown-ups.
