The rule providing for a vote on the resolution, ready to be presented on December 22, requires a majority vote, while the adoption of the resolution requires two-thirds vote.

### ELECTRIC CITY SPARKLETS

Items of Interest and Personal Mention Caught Over the Wireless on the Streets of Anderson

**Dr. Algood Was Operated Upon.**  
Dr. Algood, a well known and popular practicing physician of Anderson County, became violently ill yesterday and had to be operated upon at his home near Central. Last reports from the bedside of Dr. Algood were to the effect that he had been resting well.

**County Schools Have Holiday.**  
County school teachers reporting at the office of County Superintendent of Education J. B. Felton yesterday stated that schools in some sections had closed their doors on Friday for the Christmas holidays, while others would cease work next Wednesday. All of the county schools will resume work on Monday, January 4, 1915.

**Held Delightful Box Supper.**  
One of the most delightful box suppers and one that brought in a handsome sum of money for the use of the school improvement association was that held at Melton school last Friday night. This school is some 14 miles above Anderson, in Garvin township, and is one of the most progressive in the county.

**County Teachers Receive Salary.**  
Yesterday was a busy day with County Superintendent of Education J. B. Felton, for during the forenoon he signed the claims for salary of some 20 or more school teachers. A large number of teachers were paid off last Saturday, in fact, a larger number than were paid off yesterday.

**Much Wheat Has Been Planted.**  
According to the bulletin issued from the weather bureau at Columbia the number of acres planted in wheat in South Carolina this fall is 216,000, compared with 82,000 acres last year. The bulletin says "condition .96 per cent. of normal, compared with 10 year average of 92. Similarly in the United States 41,300,000 acres compared with 37,100,000 acres sown last year; condition 88.3 per cent., compared with 90.3, the 10 year average."

**Building Now Shows Up Well.**  
The high board fence which contractors erected in front of the new store rooms of Igon and Ledbetter while the structure was in process of erection has been torn away, revealing the beautiful lines and other excellent features of the building. The fronts are among the prettiest of any store rooms in the city, while the interiors are far above those of the average business house. The new store rooms will be ready for occupancy within the next few days.

**Newspaper Force Enjoyed Apples.**  
The Daily Intelligencer force were the recipients last night of a large bag of apples from the People's Grocery Co., and for several hours there was much munching and smacking of lips over the delectable fruit. The apples were about the largest, roundest, reddest and most delightful in taste that have been seen in the city this season. **Mr. Marrett's Condition Is Now Very Hopeful.**  
Reports yesterday from the bedside of Mr. Julius Marrett, of Fair Play, who was seriously stabbed several days ago by a negro whom he attempted to arrest, were to the effect that he is doing nicely and that there was no need for a second operation. A report was current on the streets yesterday that Mr. Marrett had succumbed to the wound, but the rumor was without foundation in fact.

**Mr. E. P. Vandiver Was Re-elected Treasurer.**  
At a recent meeting of the executive board of the Saluda Baptist Association Mr. E. P. Vandiver was re-elected treasurer. Notice of this fact is given in order that contributions may be sent to him in the future, as in the past.

**Rev. Mr. Mann To Preach Today.**  
It is announced that the Rev. J. T. Mann will preach at Gluck Mill church this morning at 11 o'clock and at Oakwood church at the usual hour tonight. The general public is cordially invited to attend services at both churches.

**Shirling Lodge Elects Officers.**  
Shirling lodge No. 44, I. O. O. F., has elected officers for the ensuing year as follows: Grady Cason, noble grand; T. H. Hall, vice grand; J. W. Cheak, secretary; B. F. Cox, recording secretary; John T. Frazier, treasurer; W. G. Williams, outside guardian; R. W. Lee, trustee for 18th months. The installation of officers will be made Friday evening, January 1. Members of the order enjoyed a delightful smoker last night.

**Funeral of a Good Old Negro.**  
The funeral services of "Aunt" Rubea Guyton will be held this afternoon at 3 o'clock in the Royal Baptist church of which she was a faithful member. "Aunt" Rubea was a highly respected colored woman and was known by many of the older residents of the city. She was 88 years of age.

**Hawthorne Case Was Continued.**  
The case against Clifford Hawthorne, colored, charged with carrying a pistol, was not tried yesterday in the court of Magistrate W. C. Broadwell, as had been scheduled, owing to the absence of material witnesses. The defendant will be given a trial at some date in the future. The negro is said to have threatened to shoot a white boy if the latter did not immediately pay for some milk which had been purchased from the negro's mother. The alleged incident occurred near the Orr Mills last Thursday.

**Home From Navy On Brief Furlough.**  
Frank Burris, an old Anderson boy, who is serving an enlistment in the United States navy, is at his home in this county on a 10 days leave. He has been aboard the U. S. S. Delaware. This is his first trip home in two years, and since that time he has been in European, West Indian and Mexican waters. He was last stationed at Vera Cruz, and left there when the American forces were withdrawn.

**Extension Work Money Received.**  
Eleven schools in Anderson County are going to share in the \$1,082 which County Treasurer Tripp has received from the State board of education for school extension work. A school that has a special tax of not less than two mills and the regular funds run the school less than five months receives State aid to the amount of their special tax, not to exceed \$100 for any school district. This office will be open to receive returns of personal property for taxation for the fiscal year from the first day of January, 1915, to the 20th of February following inclusive.  
All personal property must be returned. Real estate not returned this year but all transfers of real estate made since last returns should be noted upon the return blank when listing say on return to whom sold or from whom bought.  
The township board of assessors are required by law to list for all those that fail to make their own returns within the time prescribed, hence the difficulty of delinquents escaping the 50 per cent penalty, as well as the frequency of errors resulting from this practice by all means make your own return and thereby save expense and trouble. Ex-Confederate soldiers are exempt from poll tax, all other males between the ages of 21 and 60 years, except those incapable of earning a support from being maimed or other causes shall be deemed taxable poll.
