## SIX WHITE FAMILIES FACE SPECTRE OF STARVATION

### REPORTS FROM AUTHENTIC SOURCES PICTURE SUFFERING

### WORTHY CASES

#### Three Wives Toil to Support Invalid Husbands and Small Children.

Pitiful tales of white families in the city and county of Anderson who have been brought face to face with the spectre of starvation, and who are gazing with a kind of desperate hopelessness into the hollow sockets of the merciless monster of poverty, which has crept in the midst of their lowly homes, have been related to The Intelligencer by responsible parties. Names and addresses of the families have been left at this office, and any person desiring to take them clothing, food, fuel or any of the necessities of life may call here and get information as to how to reach them.

#### Family in Distress.

There is a family living just beyond the city limits, on the Williamston road, who are in actual want. The family consists of the father, mother and five small children. Three of the children are very small, while two are old enough to be in school. One of the smaller ones is very ill with pneumonia at present. The trouble with this household is that the father is out of a job and cannot get one. He had been a tenant on a

farm, but was forced to seek employment elsewhere. This man knows no profession and has been doing ordinary labor. The physician who is attending the sick child is reported as stating that the father is worthy in every respect, but simply cannot find work.

#### Another County Case.

A well known physician of the city reports the case of a family living some 5 1-2 miles east of Anderson on the Midway road. There are four children in the family, their ages running from 2 to 10 years. The father is an invalid and has been bedridden for the past three or four years. His faithful wife has been supporting the family by working small patches about the house, raising a bit of cotton and a few other products. Neighbors of the family have given them assistance, but they are in need of more help.

#### A Telling Mother.

A physician reports a pitiful case existing beyond the western limits of the city. A hard working wife and mother takes in washing to support an aged and invalid husband and a crippled child. They are furnished a house in which to live, and are in need of food, fuel and clothing.

#### Mill Village Case.

Though she has been a sick woman for a long time and has had to undergo an operation, a woman in a local mill village is forced to work and support a husband, who has been an invalid for over a year, and their two small children. They are in need of immediate help.
