# ANOTHER ACCOUNT OF

Slightly Different Version of Affair Given in Richland Story.

Accounts of the recent race trouble at Fair Play, in Oconee County, being in order, a story from Richland to the Columbia State, which give a somewhat different version of the affair, is reprinted below. It is as follows: Julius Marrett, the man who was

stabbed at Fair Play three weeks ago, is rapidly improving now and is reported to be practically out of danger. It will be remembered that Mr. Marrett is a merchant at Fair Play and that a negro, Byrd, was wanted for some offense in Georgia. He was located near Fair Play. An officer from Georgia came for him, but fearing the negro would recognize him and get away he sent Mr. Marrett with the warrant. He entered the negro's house and while reading the warrant the negro stabbed him with a butcher knife, took his pistol away from him and fled. The knife struck Mr. Marrett just below the heart and split one rib and punctured one lung. For some days there seemed to be little hope for his recovery. Some half dozen doctors were summoned and finally the split rib was taken out and he has been improving ever since. The negro was captured near Tallulah

Falls and is now in jail in Georgia. Ten days ago a negro named Spright was found making preparation to burn a home about seven miles southeast of Fair Play (Oconee), in Anderson County, and on Sunday morning, December 13, Woodrow Campbell and John McDonald came to Fair Play with the negro Tom Spright tied in an automobile and two other negroes with them. Magistrate Mc-Clure of Fair Play joined them. They made for the Georgia side to have the other two negroes whip Tom Spright. Near Knox's bridge they met two sons of Green Gibson, a negro, and some words passed not satisfactory to the posse, so they seized one of the boys and tied him and put him in the automobile and crossed the river, entering a vacant house near the public road and began whipping Spright and the Gibson negro. The other son of Green Gibson ran home for his father. They came to the whipping with their shotguns and at once shots were changed in rapid succession. Just at this point Paul Marrett was passing along the public road on his way to Georgia. Some one hailed him. He was in a top buggy, with curtains up. He stuck his head around the curtain to see what was going on just in time to receive several slaps on hand and face. He happened to be armed and jumped from his buggy and began firing with his pistol. After the firing ceased one Gibson boy was found in a dying condition and died in a short time, Spright was badly beaten with buggy traces, but was found and car-ried to Hartwell jail and is there now. Campbell, McDonald and Magistrate McClure all received varying amounts of small shot. Green Gibson and his

other son took cover under the pridge during the skirmish and retreated in good order. Green Gibson, the old negro, ran to his landlord, Allen Marrett, near Fair Play, and asked for advice and protection. Marrett advised him to take to the heavy time bered lands northeast of Fair Play and at times these conditions interfered seriously with his work. By
