The low price of cotton is depressing business very much. It is said very little trading is being done. Those who sell cotton do not spend but little of the money. They either pay it on obligations or lay it away.

Dr. Ingram, who will be here the 23d inst. for a week, comes well recommended, and is a graduate of the Northern Illinois College of Chicago. Any one needing glasses will do well to see him, as his work is up-to-date in every particular.

Rev. B. E. Grandy and his sons, Lloyd and Roy, have had their hands full of work all this summer and fall, building houses in the lower counties of the state. They have contracts ahead which will keep them busy for several months.

Our old friends Maj. G. W. Bowen and Mr. Reece Nimmons are doing a splendid business ginning cotton at Mr. Silas F. Robinson's. They get custom from Greenville county because they do good work and charge such reasonable prices.

Another splendid, up-to-date plant is the ginnery, saw and grits mill of Mr. Thomas Julian, near Cross Roads church. This is a new plant and located in a prosperous section, and Mr. Julian is kept busy trying to meet the requirements of his customers. Such enterprises as this show the progressive spirit of the people.

While attending the Pickens Association last week we saw many evidences of prosperity. The cotton fields were white and well laden with the fleecy staple. The corn was abundant and exceedingly good. The farmers will gather a large crop of corn and a fair crop of cotton.

Mr. J. L. Looper, who lives near Cross Roads church, has one of the best up-to-date ginneries to be found anywhere. The building is large and the best improved machinery and methods for handling cotton is used. It is fire-proof. Mr. Looper is kept quite busy.

The Pickens Chapter U. D. C. held a very interesting meeting at the home of the president, Mrs. T. J. Mauldin, last Friday afternoon. Miss Florence Bowen was elected delegate to the state convention which will be held in Greenville.

Capt. J. T. Taylor has been in North Carolina for the past ten days. He with others who are interested in the Cullowee Copper Mine have been installing a new smelter plant. They hope to resume operation of the mine at an early day.

It is said that there is one man who lives on the Saluda river, in this county, who will gather six thousand bushels of corn this year. That man is Mr. Henry Pace, who owns several hundred acres of very fine land, among them being many acres of the very best bottom land. It was told to us that he had saved sixteen thousand bundles of fodder, and besides his fine corn crop will make several bales of cotton, peavine hay, molasses, potatoes, etc. His farm will yield him this year at least \$10,000. Why do people want to leave Pickens county when they can make such crops as this?

**Death of Mrs. S. A. Alexander.**  
In the death of Mrs. Sarah A. Alexander another one of our oldest and well known citizens has been removed from us. Her death occurred at her home in Big Eastatoe last Saturday, 14th inst. It was not unexpected as she had been in declining and feeble health for several months. She was one of the best known women in the county and numbered her friends by her acquaintances. She was about 83 years old and is survived by two daughters, Mrs. T. W. Folger of Central, and Mrs. W. K. Boggs, and several children and other relatives. The funeral services were held at her late residence last Sunday and her remains were interred in the family burying ground near by. She will be missed for her many noble traits and generous acts. Always kind, affable and devoted to her family and friends. The poor found a friend and helper in her. By her upright and honorable life she won the confidence and admiration of all who knew her. We tender our sincere sympathies to her loved ones and friends who are left to mourn her departure.

**Judge Klugh Dead.**  
Judge J. C. Klugh died at his home at Abbeville on the 12th inst. He was 54 years old and is survived by his wife and six children. He had been in failing health for two or three years. 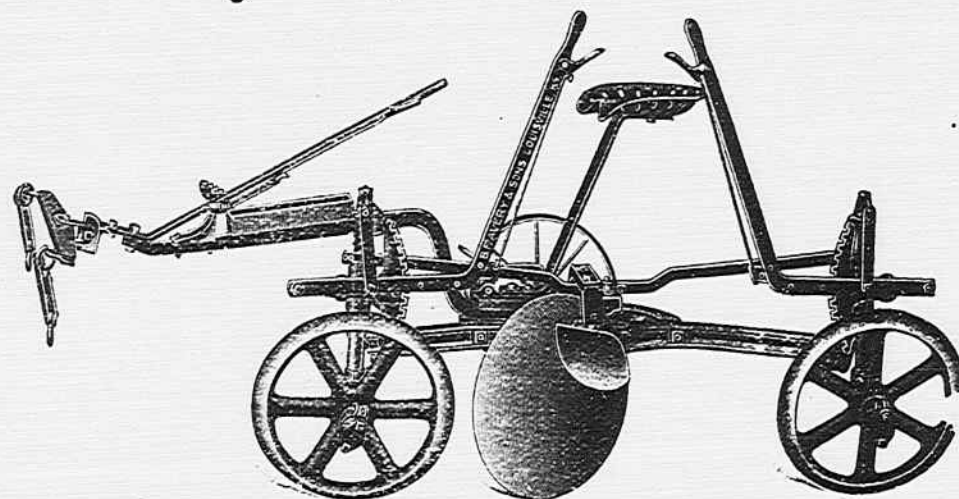
