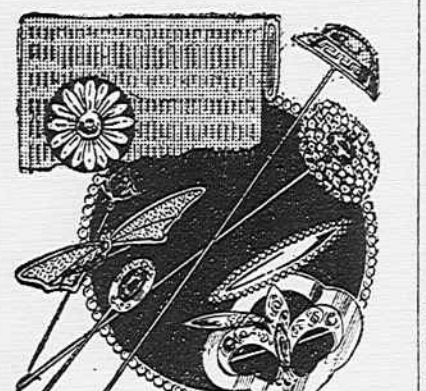
Looper-Hogsed
