C., on the Board of Control. There are many sick veterans in the hospital, and an appeal has been made for necessary supplies and comforts. JAKE GOSNELL TO BE TRIED IN PICKENS COUNTY FOR MURDER.

Circuit Judge George E. Prince Monday granted a change of venue from Greenville to Pickens county for the trial of Jake Gosnell, revenue agent, indicted for the alleged murder of Sheriff Hendrix Rector, July 4, 1919. In presenting the motion, counsel for the defense introduced an affidavit made by Gosnell in which he said he could not secure a fair and impartial trial in Greenville, owing to the fact that the sheriff, whose duty it was to summon jurors, is a brother of the deceased.

The case of the state against Sullivan, in which the defendant, Sullivan, was indicted for the alleged murder of the half brother of Sheriff Gilreath, of Greenville county, almost thirty years ago, was cited, as was the decision of the supreme court, upholding the lower court in granting a change of venue.

Solicitor Smoak, while not objecting to a change of venue, declared that he had every confidence in the jurors of Greenville county and in the sheriff. The defense replied that no reflection on the sheriff was intended by the motion. The solicitor said the state was perfectly willing that the trial be transferred to Pickens county.

At the first trial last year of Jake Gosnell for the alleged murder, a mistrial was ordered when the court of general sessions jury reported that it could not agree on a verdict.

PICKENS TEXTILE LEAGUE.

Baseball League Formed of Pickens County Mill Clubs.

At a meeting of baseball enthusiasts last Tuesday night a baseball league composed entirely of Pickens county clubs was formed and given the name of Pickens County Textile League. Teams which have entered the league are Easley Mill No. 1, Easley No. 3 at Liberty, Alice Mill and Glenwood Mill. Gary Hiatt was elected president of the league and Roy R. Smith, secretary and treasurer.

Probate Judge for Pickens County to be Chosen.

A probate judge of Pickens county to fill out the unexpired term of the late Judge J. B. Newbery, who recently died in office, will be chosen in a special election to be held next Tuesday, March 22.

Up until two weeks ago there were six candidates offering for the office, but the withdrawal of J. Alonzo Brown leaves five in the race, as follows: Mrs. Lena Cox, N. A. Christopher, Elias Day, Rev. R. A. Hudson and A. S. Porter. Much interest is being taken in the race and the fact that this is the first time in the history of the county that a woman has offered for public office adds some novelty.

General election rules will govern this special election and there will be no second race, the candidate receiving the largest number of votes will be declared elected.

Whereas, a petition has been filed with the trustees of Keowee School District No. 42, in said county and state, signed by more than one-third of the resident electors and an equal number of the resident freeholders of the age of twenty-one years of said school district, as appears by the certificates of the County Auditor of said county attached to said petition, praying that the trustees of said school district order an election to the question of issuing coupon bonds in the sum of \$1,250 by said district for the purpose of school improvement.
