CITIZENS TRAINING CAMP

An opportunity is given young Americans to attend the Citizens Military Training Camp to be held this year, at Fort McClellan, near Anniston, Alabama, between July 27, 1922 and August 26, 1922.

The purpose of the Citizens Military Training Camps is to furnish young Americans a chance to secure a military training under favorable conditions, and to so develop them physically, mentally and morally as to increase their ability to render service to their country in time of need.

Three courses of instruction will be held this year. They will be known as the Red, the White and the Blue.

IN MEMORY OF JUDGE J. B. NEWBERRY

As June 3rd draws near our minds are naturally turned to the thoughts of the soldiers of the 60's.

Among these honored heroes, Judge Newberry, who died a little more than a year ago, fills a prominent place in our memory.

On July 1st, 1861, he enlisted in Co "K", 6th South Carolina regiment where he served until the 11th of March 1862.

After the war they settled in Anderson county where he lived till 1872 when he moved to Pickens and established the first circular saw mill operated in this county.

He always took a deep interest in the welfare of the old soldiers and their widows, and his memory will ever be cherished by those whom he loved and served so faithfully.
