## THE PICKENS-BREVARD ROAD.

Work On This Road Will Be Resumed In August.

It will be good news to the people of Pickens county to know that work will soon be resumed on the Pickens-Brevard highway. Bids for the completion of the road are now being advertised for, and the contract will be let August 15. Work will begin as soon thereafter as the successful bidder can get his force on the ground.

Twelve miles of the road have been completed but no work has been done since the first of June. Eight and a half miles of road remain to be built on the Pickens side and five or six miles on the North Carolina side. When these links are built the road will be completed into Brevard via Rosman. The North Carolina route has already been surveyed and work is about ready to begin.

With average weather the entire road should be completed early in 1923 in ample time to take care of next summer's tourist travel.

The completion of this road will mean much to Pickens and Transylvania counties. It will be the nearest route into Western North Carolina from Georgia, Florida and Southwestern South Carolina and it is expected that summer travel over the road will be heavy. It will put Pickens and Transylvania in closer touch with each other and the outside world, and will open the splendid markets of Easley, Liberty and Pickens to the farmers of Transylvania and upper Pickens. With the opening of the road it is also expected that the beautiful mountain section of Pickens county will be developed into summer resorts that will rival those of Western North Carolina.

## TABLE ROCK ONCE FAMOUS

Governor Alston Present at July 4th Celebration There

The proposed restoration of the Table Rock section of Pickens county as a summer resort on a large scale recalls to mind that before the Civil war this section was probably the most famous summer resort of the two Carolinas and was visited by large numbers of wealthy people of the low country.

It may not be generally known to the present generation, but the biggest fourth of July celebration ever pulled off in this section was staged on top of Table Rock before the war when the fourth was celebrated in a real patriotic manner. The celebration was arranged by the late Col. Benj. Haged of Pickens. Among the features of the day was the carrying of a cannon to the top of the rock and firing it there. There were many distinguished guests present, among them being Governor Alston, who delivered an address.

There is no reason why Pickens county should not regain and surpass its former prestige as a summer resort. Nature has wonderfully provided many advantages and with the advent of good roads no doubt man will provide the rest. The building of a large resort hotel by Messrs. Chastain and Carey is looked upon here as the beginning of the restoration of this favored section to its former pristine glory.
