ELECTION

Craig, Findley McKinney

The most complete returns that could be obtained up to two o'clock Wednesday indicates that Congressman Dominick has been reelected. He has carried every county in the district. The vote reported at two o'clock was Dominick 13,996, Mc-Cravy 8,418, Sherard 4,574.

At two o'clock Wednesday afternoon the vote reported in the governor's race was Blease 65,352, Mc-Leod 55,655, Laney 18,582. Blease and McLeod run over.

From election returns from every precinct in Pickens county the results of the first primary are as follows:

John E. Craig is elected state senator in a landslide vote.

Elbert Findley is elected to the house on the first ballot and J. O. Williams and J. M. Garrett will make a second race for the house.

J. T. McKinney is reelected supervisor in first race.

J. A. Findley led in the field for county commissioner, but failed of a majority. As no candidate in this race received a majority vote the four highest will be in the second race as follows: Finley, Bowen, Mullinax and Herd.

Christopher and Hudsen will make second race for probate judge.

Complete returns, with the exception of Peters Creek and Cross Roads show the following vote for governor in Pickens county: Blease 2313, Cantey, 33, Coleman 103, Duncan 52, Laney 392, McLeod 1052.

These returns were received over slight errors, but will not affect the laham. result as above stated. The returns are as correct and complete as ean be had until the official count.

Much interest was shown in the different and Pickens county polled the largest vote in history. Many women voted.

Returns for state candidates early Wednesday morning show the following for governor: Bleast leading with 55.856, McLeod second with 51,-672, Laney third with 17,070. Blease and McLecd make second race.

Jackson and Owens probably in second race for lieutenant governor. Dove reelected sceretary of state.

Wolf probably reelected attorney general though he may have to run second race with Winter.

Duncan reelected comptroller gen-

Craig elected adjutant and inspector general.

Harris reelected commissioner of agriculture.

For superintendent of education Swearingen and Hope will likely be in second race. Vote as follows: Swearingen 30,806, Hope 28,995, Mrs. Drake 26,931.

RESORT MAY BE DEVELOPED ON TABLE ROCK BY NORTHERN MEN.

Definite plans for the purchase and development of 2,322 acres of land adjoining Table Rock Cove in Pickens county by New York capitalists were announced last week. While detailed plans have not been given, it is understood that the development will include the building of a hotel on the top of Table Rock, the construction of roads to this pinnacle and surrounding territory and the transformation of the tract into a recreational grounds and a summer colony. This project is not connected with the recent move to build a 30-room hotel at the base of Table Rock, it is stated.

Both Table Rock and Bald Knob are incuded in the tract purchased, giving a location that cannot be excelled in the two Carolinas for a summer playground. Tourist's roads will be constructed from the highways to the resort and afford safe and pleasant travel over this historic district, according to plans. It is the hope of premoters to have the resort ready for occupancy by the summer of 1923.

The hotel will be constructed on tep of the rock and probably be built of stene, it was stated. Tourists now camps about the base of the rock, and it is believed by promoters that the hotel on the peak of the towering reck will prove a great attraction when completed.

A splendid highway from Pick ens to Sutherland's store, three miles from the base of Table Rock, has already been completed and another from Picheus to Brevard, N. C., will soon make the point accessible from from that side, while the proposed Greenville-Brevard highway will weld a third link. The resert will quickly become popular, it is believed. When the Greenville-Brevard road is completed the resert can be reached from this city in one hour and a half, it was estimated.

Bids will be received for the construction of approximately eight miles of road on what is known as the Anderson-Liberty road, at the office of the Anderson county highway commission announced this morning.

The cest of this read, according to members of the highway commission, will approximate \$38,000, half of which will be defrayed by federal aid apportionment for this particular read. The commission has funds for their half of the road, and expect to begin the construction immediately after the bids have been received and one accepted .- Anderson Mail.
