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## Big Development at Reedy Cove

Anderson Men to Build Summer Resort in Pickens County.

Mr. Albert Farmer, Mr. R. E. Ligon and about eight other gentlemen of Anderson have closed a deal through Mr. W. H. Chastain to purchase about 120 acres of land known as Reedy Cove about 15 miles from here on the main top soil road from this place to Brevard.

These gentlemen, it is understood have bought this property for the purpose of developing it into a summer resort. Mr. Chastain stated that they intended building a lake and quite a number of cottages for summer occupants and tourists. It is also thought that Cove creek and the adjoining streams will be stocked with fish, that drive ways will be built around the lake and that a number of small boats will be on hand for any who like boating.

It is said to be an ideal place for such development, one of the best in that part of the mountain section, and that no pains or means will be spared to make it an up to date recreational place.

## Pickens Schools Open Sept. 18; List of the Teachers and Rules

The Pickens High School will begin its next session on September 18 at nine o'clock. All who are interested in the school are invited to attend the opening.

The teachers for the session 1922-1923 are: Miss Louise Culpepper, Fort Gaines, Ga., first grade and part of the second grade work; Miss Grace Mathews, Pickens, part of the second grade work and the third grade; Miss Lula King, Pavo, Ga., fourth grade and part of the fifth grade work; Mrs. J. M. Morris, Pickens, part of the fifth grade work and the sixth grade; Mrs. Ada Alexander, Pickens, part of the fifth grade work and the seventh grade. Teachers for the high school are: Miss Ruby Berryman, Royston, Ga., Latin and French; Miss Mary Morris, Pickens, English and History; S. C. Boone, Hartsville, Science, Biology, Chemistry, Physics, and Arithmetic; F. W. Simpson, principal, Algebra, Geometry, and Modern History.

The text books for the several grades are: First Grade.—Winston First Reader and Primer Combined; Practical Writing Manual No. 1.

Second Grade: Winston Second Reader; Arnold's Mastery of Words, Book 1; Practical Writing Manual No. 2.

Pupils who were not promoted need not buy any books except in those subjects which have been changed. No pupil should buy a book before he investigates to see if he has the book already. Pupils who have any

of the above named books may write their names and the price they ask and sell to students in the school, providing they do not need the books themselves.

Pupils who enter the elementary grades from other districts will pay \$3.00 per month for tuition. Pupils do not have to pay tuition under the present law if they enter the high school. All tuition is payable in advance.

Examinations will be given in all grades that pupils wish to enter but have not promotion cards. These examinations will be held on September 18.

No pupil whose sixth birthday does not come before January 1, 1923, will be enrolled as a pupil in the school for this session. All pupils expecting to enter the first grade must start at the first of the session so that additional classes will not have to be made.

The first bell will ring at 8:30. All pupils who come to school before that time will wait at the curb until the bell rings and will then go into their respective rooms to study under the direction of their teacher until 8:50, when the second bell will ring for all the pupils to gather in the auditorium or gymnasium in their rooms for devotional exercises. At 9 o'clock the regular class work will begin.

If it is raining when pupils arrive at school before 8:30, they may take shelter in the front corridor outside the front door, if it does not happen too frequently that the pupil comes too early.

It will be necessary for all teachers to be in their places at 8:30 when the first bell rings, to direct pupils who may need assistance in their lessons.

If a pupil willfully or carelessly defaces, marks, or injures the school building or fixtures he will be liable for the damage and if he refuses to make it good may be punished or dismissed from the school, as the individual case may deserve.

No pupil will leave the school grounds without permission from the principal. From 8:30 till he is dismissed by his teacher. Any pupil who secures permission to leave the grounds must attend promptly to the matter for which he left and return.

Permission will not be given for pupils to remain at the stores or public buildings. Pupils are expected to conduct themselves when they leave the school grounds with the permission of the principal, just as they should at the school. Any pupil who violates this trust or who is tardy in returning will be punished and will thereafter be kept at school till the close of the daily session.

Upon dismissal each pupil must proceed directly home and must not remain around the stores and public buildings. This does not mean that pupils who are kept at school for athletic training or who have music lessons may not remain till such training or lesson is over.
