

### Sturdy Wraps Defy Winter; Fur Coats for Midwinter

ABOUT all that stands between the up-to-date young girl and freezing is the wrap she wears. Except for sports wear, she looks with disfavor on heavy clothes and will have none of them, but she expects much in the way of protection from her outer garments, her coats, capes, sweaters, scarfs and headwear, and she receives much.

and many fur coats really deserve to be called magnificent. Their creators provided a wealth of styles at the beginning of the season, including short and long coats, all of them generous in proportions and most of them endowed with huge collars and ample sleeves. There are coats and coat-wraps, varied in details of construction, but usually simple as to lines. The smart short coat, fashionable for day-time wear, has had many admirers, but the long coat or wrap, muffling the figure, remains the favorite and

vides the inside or the outside for many coats and wraps. For sports wear there are leather coats lined with fur in which one feels equal to exploring the north pole.

A handsome coat of dark velours, in brown and green leather mixture, lined with muskrat, is shown in the picture. It has a plain seal collar and is cut on simple and practical lines, so that it will answer all the needs of the young girl, for wear day in and out, during the winter. It is handsome enough and conservative enough to fit in with any background and the picture tells its story in detail. For school, sports, motoring, the leather coat leaves nothing to be desired. In the milder climates, soft, heavy cloths,

stands foremost in the ranks of outer garments.

Two sumptuous fur coats are illustrated here, at the left a full, straight coat of Siberian squirrel and at the right a beautiful model made of Hudson seal. The squirrel coat has a muffler collar and large, straight sleeves with wide cuffs in which the pelts are sewed so as to run in an opposite direction to those in the sleeves. It has a handsome girdle of plaited, gray silk braid, ending in rich tassels that fall below the bottom of the coat. Such a garment may be worn anywhere.

The coat of Hudson seal, at the right, is cut on similar lines, achieving extra fullness at the back, where

interlined, are warm enough and coats or capes of Scotch cashmere, camels-hair, English Shetland or velours, often with fur collars, are thoroughly practical.

Even the cold of midwinter may be accorded a cheerful welcome by the woman who is to meet it in a handsome fur coat. There is a suggestion of luxury and well-being in furs, much to the liking of the eterna feminine

It is gathered to a short, plain yoke. The very wide muffler collar is of kolinsky fur and the impressive girdle of black silk braid, ending in handsome tassels, hanging as the mode demands.

### LESSON FOR DECEMBER A LESSON IN TRUST AND PARENDS

LESSON TEXT—Luke 12:13-40. GOLDEN TEXT—The life is more than meat, and the body is more than raiment. PRIMARY TOPIC—The Story of the Foolish Rich Man. JUNIOR TOPIC—A Foolish Rich Man. INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—Rich Toward God. YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULTS TOPIC—True Riches.

Since on October 8 we had a lesson on the birth and childhood of Jesus, many will doubtless prefer to study this new lesson instead of the one on the manna.

#### I. A Warning Against Covetousness (vv. 13-21).

1. The Occasion (vv. 13-15). The company requested Jesus to enter into a disputed estate with them. Christ refused to enter into the sphere of the civil law and against the spirit of avarice. His mission was preeminently spiritual. 2. Enforcement of the Warning (vv. 16-21). The parable of the rich man shows clearly that to be content with earthly riches while neglecting God is the height of folly. The warning is of great importance for many are seeking gold and silver. Note (1) his riches (v. 16). His riches were obtained, for the ground brought forth plentifully. This shows that he may be rich because of the blessing upon him. (2) His pride (v. 17). His land was produced more than he could hold. He wanted it to go to waste. If he had used the right views of his stewardship before would have seen that his barn had enough for his personal use, that he could have distributed plus to the needy and for other purposes. (3) The fatal error (v. 18, 19). He chose to enlarge his barns and give up his life to luxury. It ought to be a task for men whom God has rich to devote their time to the distribution of their wealth to benevolent purposes. (4) The final indictment (vv. 20, 21). He is a fool.

#### II. The Certain Cure (vv. 32-34).

Having shown the folly of the man who gained gold but lost his soul, Jesus now urged the disciples to be content and dismiss all anxious thoughts. He assured them that they need not be anxious even for the necessities of life.

#### 1. The Argument (vv. 32-34).

It is summed up in one brief statement: "The life is more than raiment, and the body is more than meat." The man who gave the life and made the body should be trusted to provide food and clothing.

2. The Illustrations (vv. 24-28). (1) God's care for the fowls (vv. 24-26). The ravens do not sow nor reap—they have no storehouse or barn, yet they live, for God feeds them. If God does not forget the fowls, certainly He will not forget His children. (2) God's care for the flowers of the field (vv. 27, 28). If God is so careful of those flowers which appear but for a day, how much more will He clothe His children!

3. The Exhortations (vv. 29-34). (1) Make not the getting of food and clothes your chief concern. Trust God to provide them. (2) Seek the kingdom of God (v. 31). Those who make God's kingdom first shall have all their needs supplied (Phil. 4:19). (3) Be not afraid (v. 32). God's good pleasure is upon His own, and all good things will He give them. (4) Practice self-denial in order to be able to give gifts to those in need (vv. 33, 34). The doing of such deeds will tend to lift the thoughts upward to God—to trust Him.

#### III. Be Ready for the Coming of the Lord (vv. 35-40).

Having warned the disciples against the acquisition of worldly goods while forgetting God, and shown them the needlessness of anxiety for food and clothes, He shows them the blessedness of being in a state of readiness when the Lord shall come. Conviction as to the certainty of the Lord's coming is the sure cure for worldliness and anxious care. This attitude of heart He made clear by two parables—that of the returning of the Lord and that of the thief. The Lord will be so pleased with those who are waiting for Him that He will take delight in sitting at the banquet with them, and even serve them. The parable of the thief shows that the time of the Lord's coming is not known.
