Injured in Auto Accident.

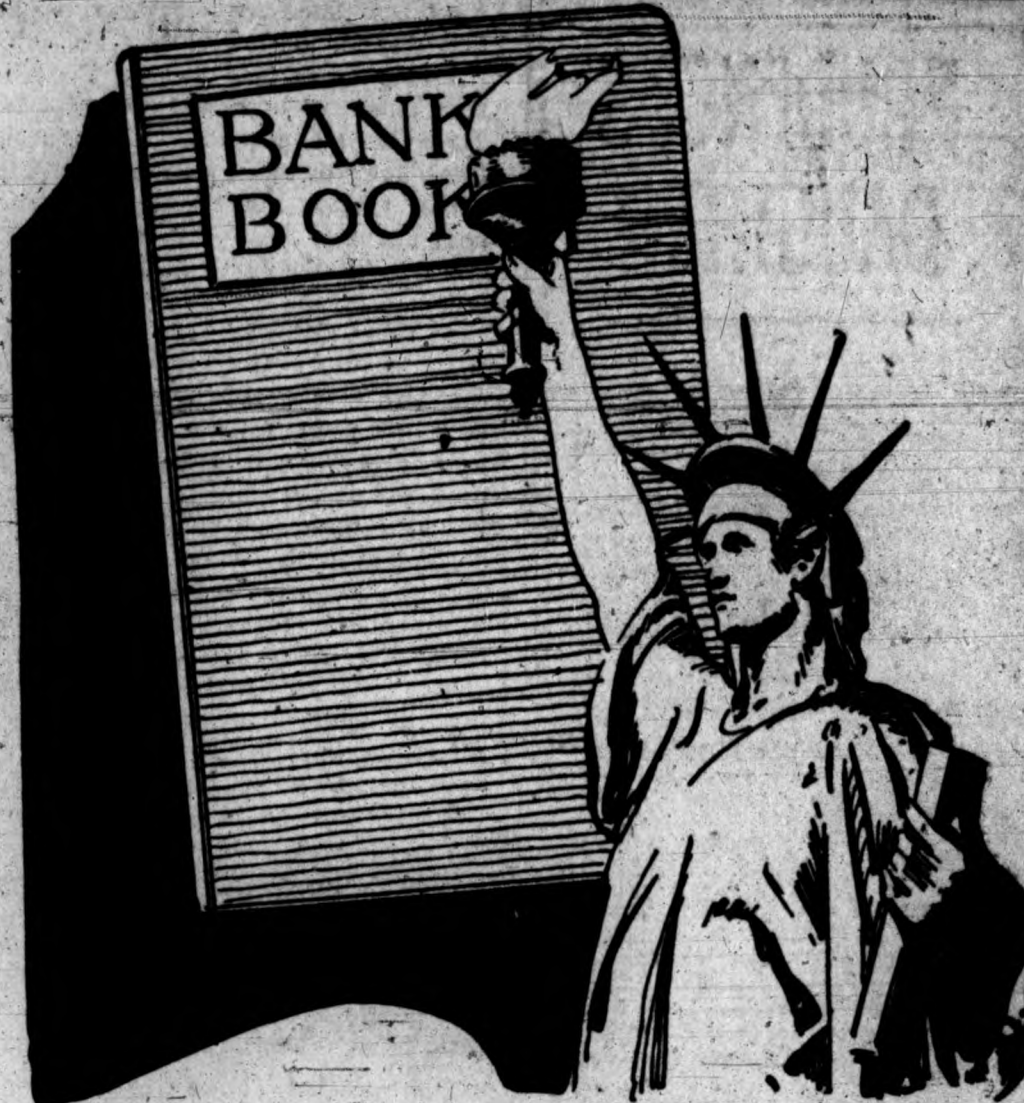
