A Panoramic View of Georgia State Fair Grounds at Savannah



Automobiles by the thousands were parked at the Georgia State Fair grounds last year with the least confusion and annoyance to patrons. Ample police protection, assistance of Boy Scouts in directing traffic and vigilance of official fair committees, encouraged automobile attendance. Being on the South Atlantic Coastal Highway, the fair grounds are accessible by easy travel. The view shows several thousand cars parked so that any can leave immediately. To the left and center are the principal exhibit buildings, in the middle are the tented attractions; and to the right is the \$12,000 roller coaster erected last season. This year the fair will open October 26 and close October 31.

Judge Peter W. Meldrim of Savannah
Judge Meldrim was elected president last year of the Georgia State Agricultural Society to succeed J. H. Mills of Jenkinsburg. He assumed his duties at a mid-winter meeting held in his chambers at Savannah in February, and immediately plans were started for a decidedly increased agricultural department of the Georgia State Fair for the sixth season, October 26-31.

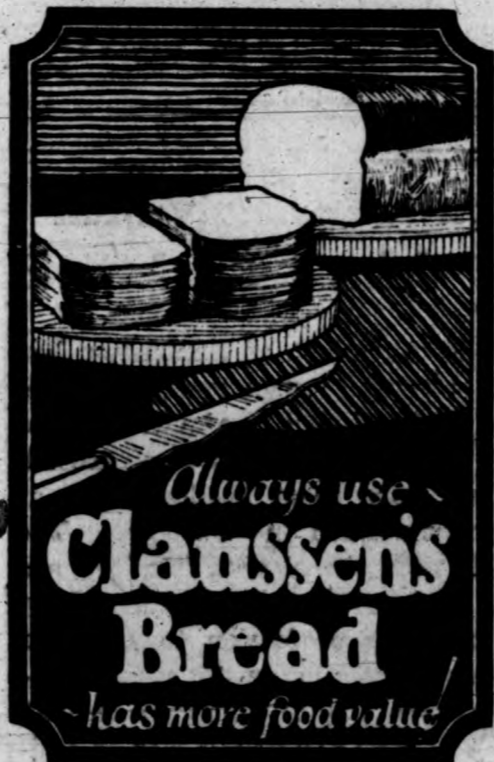
The summer or annual meeting of the organization, it was announced, will be held in Athens on Wednesday, August 12, when a number of papers on new scientific discoveries of interest will be submitted, as a preliminary. Among the vice presidents who attended the winter meeting were George Gilmore, Sandersville; J. L. Moore, Aragon; A. Whitaker, Conyers; James W. Horton, Athens; W. D. Hammock, Coleman; S. D. Trull, Sparta; J. F. Woodall, Woodland; W. E. Harvin, Edison; Mills B. Lane, Savannah; B. M. Gaddis, Valdosta; A. E. Gibson, Edison, secretary; A. W. Morehouse, president, and W. A. Johnson, vice president, Savannah Fair, Jr.

The following district committeemen were elected: J. W. Porter, Cedar-town, seventh district; Altie Burckman, Mayfield, tenth district; W. S. Atkinson, Waverly, eleventh district. The Society is co-operating to the fullest extent with the Georgia State Fair to make its agricultural department peerless. The Society officers and committeemen are working towards bringing fifty county exhibits from all parts of Georgia to Savannah this fall. The response already has been gratifying.

When elected president, Judge Meldrim had this to say of the Georgia State Agricultural Society: "It was formed in 1810 by a group of far-seeing and broad-minded men, and this is the oldest organization of its kind today in the United States. There has been much in its history to encourage, and when I looked into the constitution of that society as it was originally ordained, I was both gratified and surprised at the liberality and vision of the men who formed it. The object of this society is to obtain and diffuse information pertaining to agriculture, manufacture, mechanics, livestock, horticulture and other industries of the people of Georgia, so that those wise men without regard to their own callings had the vision to take in practically every activity of the state."
