

756 Bales Prior to August First

There were 756 bales of cotton ginned in Barnwell County from the crop of 1925 prior to August 16th, 1925, as compared with none to the same date last year, according to a report just made public by the Department of Commerce.

About 1,900 bales had been marketed at Barnwell up to Tuesday night of this week, which probably establishes a record for this season of the year. The crop has opened rapidly and the farmers have taken advantage of the fine weather to gather

Others claim that the early opening of cotton indicates a small crop and is misleading a large number of people into the belief of a big yield. Reports from over the State indicate that cotton is opening rapidly in practically every county. The co-operative marketing association reports exceptionally heavy receipts. They claim that a declining market increases their membership.
