School Notes

An Announcement to the Patrons.

It is the earnest desire of the board of trustees that this session should be the best session that the Barnwell schools have ever had. We wish to keep our school growing not only in size but in its influence for good in the community, county and State. We hope to keep it constantly improving in size, in equipment, and in the quality of work done as well as in the amount of work accomplished by the pupils. In order to accomplish these aims the board of trustees have used all the care and judgment possible in our selection of superintendent and teachers and in the formation of policies for the school for the year. After the first week of school we feel that we have been fortunate as well as careful in our selection of teachers and now believe that all that is necessary to a most successful year's work is steady and constant study on the part of the pupils. With proper co-operation on the part of the patrons, teachers, superintendent and trustees this will be secured.

This announcement is really a plea on the part of the trustees for this co-operation from the patrons, not simply in the things that affect your own child directly but also in all the work of the school. Your trustees are busy men who serve without pay as your representatives in employing teachers, forming policies and in looking after the finances of the school. We wish to be really representative and therefore to know the ideas of the patrons and therefore we shall welcome any suggestions from patrons or friends of the school at any time as to any phase of the work, or any questions as to policy shall receive our immediate, careful and courteous attention.

However, the members of the board do not feel that they should be burdened with the small details of the school and its internal management as to the work of teachers or pupils. The internal management of the school is properly the work of the superintendent. All questions, suggestions, or complaints as to the work of the teachers or pupils, all matters of behavior or discipline, all matters that relate to individuals or classes should go to the superintendent directly instead of having to reach him indirectly through some member of the board of trustees. All cases of this kind must ultimately reach the superintendent and be decided by him. That is what he is employed for. Less confusion and annoyance and less opportunity for misunderstanding will result if the parents will carry all such matters directly to the superintendent. Not only this but quicker and more satisfactory results will be secured from the conference with the superintendent. Both parent and superintendent may get a new viewpoint and new light on their problem of doing what is best for the school and the individual child. The superintendent will appreciate your interest and will give your suggestions courteous and immediate attention. In case of difficulties, and misunderstandings he will be glad to give every assistance possible and to explain the position of the school and its authorities. For the reasons that he is in touch with the pupils and that he understands the needs and requirements of the pupils and the school and the problems of school management better than we do and since he is our school expert and the solution of all questions of internal management rests with him; we earnestly request that all such questions be carried to him directly and immediately.

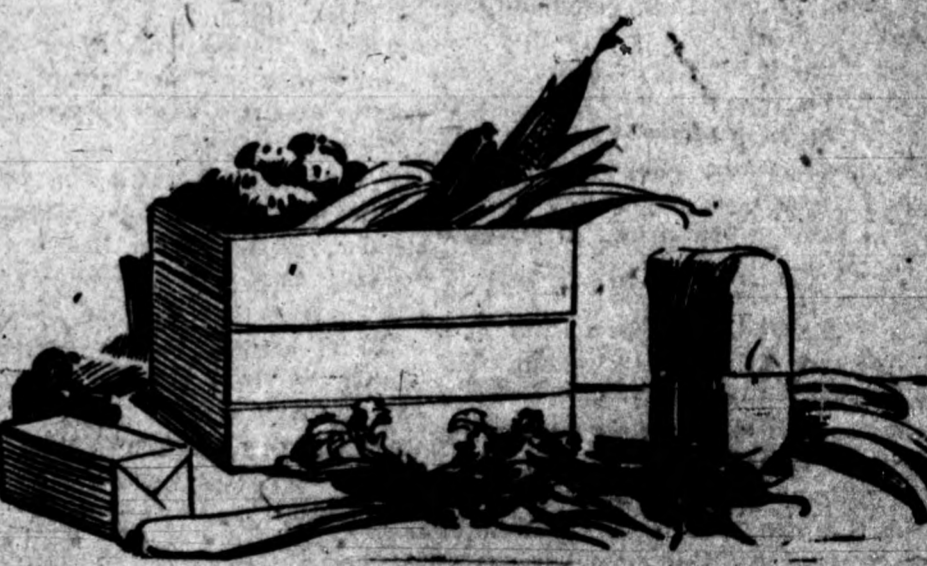
