The schools will take up the following subjects:

- 1. Agricultural situations as relating to the use of fertilizer for 1926.
2. Factors controlling yields.
3. Experiment station results and fertilizer recommendations for different soils and crops.
4. Advantages of using higher grade fertilizers and fewer formulas.

These schools will be begun at Clemson College at 10:30 Monday morning, December 7th, and will be carried on at the different places during the week in the State.

They will only last from 10:30 to 1:00 p. m., allowing folks to return to dinner.

Several well informed speakers will be present at each of these meetings where fertilizer problems will be discussed and all questions relating to same will be answered.

The meeting most interesting to the farmers of this county will be held Thursday, December 10th, at Allendale.

We should make an effort to attend this meeting and I feel sure it will result in benefit to every one who is interested in using fertilizers in the most profitable way.
