The funeral services were conducted at 3:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon at Steel Creek Baptist Church, the Rev. E. H. Clark officiating in the presence of a large concourse of sorrowing relatives and sympathetic friends from every section of Barnwell County.

Major Meyer was loved by all who knew him, for he was one of the most lovable men that it has ever been the good fortune of this writer to come in contact with.

Major Meyer deemed it a pleasure and a privilege to favor a friend, and he had no enemies to punish.

CHRISTMAS SEAL CAMPAIGN OPENS

HOPE TO INCREASE PER CAPITA SALE THIS YEAR.

Importance Shown by Fact That Tuberculosis Claimed 19 in County Last Year.

"If no one asks you to buy Christmas Seals—ask someone to sell you some." This is the appeal made today by Mrs. A. A. Lemon, campaign manager, who said that many people wanting seals would undoubtedly be missed in the general selling campaign, and that those that were not approached were urged to get in touch with the local committee.

For the convenience of those wishing to procure more seals and those not solicited, the little penny "for health" seals will also be placed on sale in the downtown streets, the manager announced.

It is hoped to increase the per capita sale of Christmas Seals this year and to win the highest place in the State Seal Sale Honor Roll.

The Christmas Seal Sale does not ask much of any one, but it asks something of every one," said Mrs. Lemon.

The larger the sale of Christmas Seals the greater will be the health work we can do in our county next year.

In announcing plans for the sale, the local committee called attention to the fact that the Christmas Seal sale is not to be confused with the Red Cross roll call, which has just been completed.

The importance of the campaign and the necessity for using a stamp or seal, on every letter or package going out between now and January is shown by the fact that 19 deaths occurred in Barnwell County last year from tuberculosis and there are now 190 persons in the county who are suffering from this dread disease.
