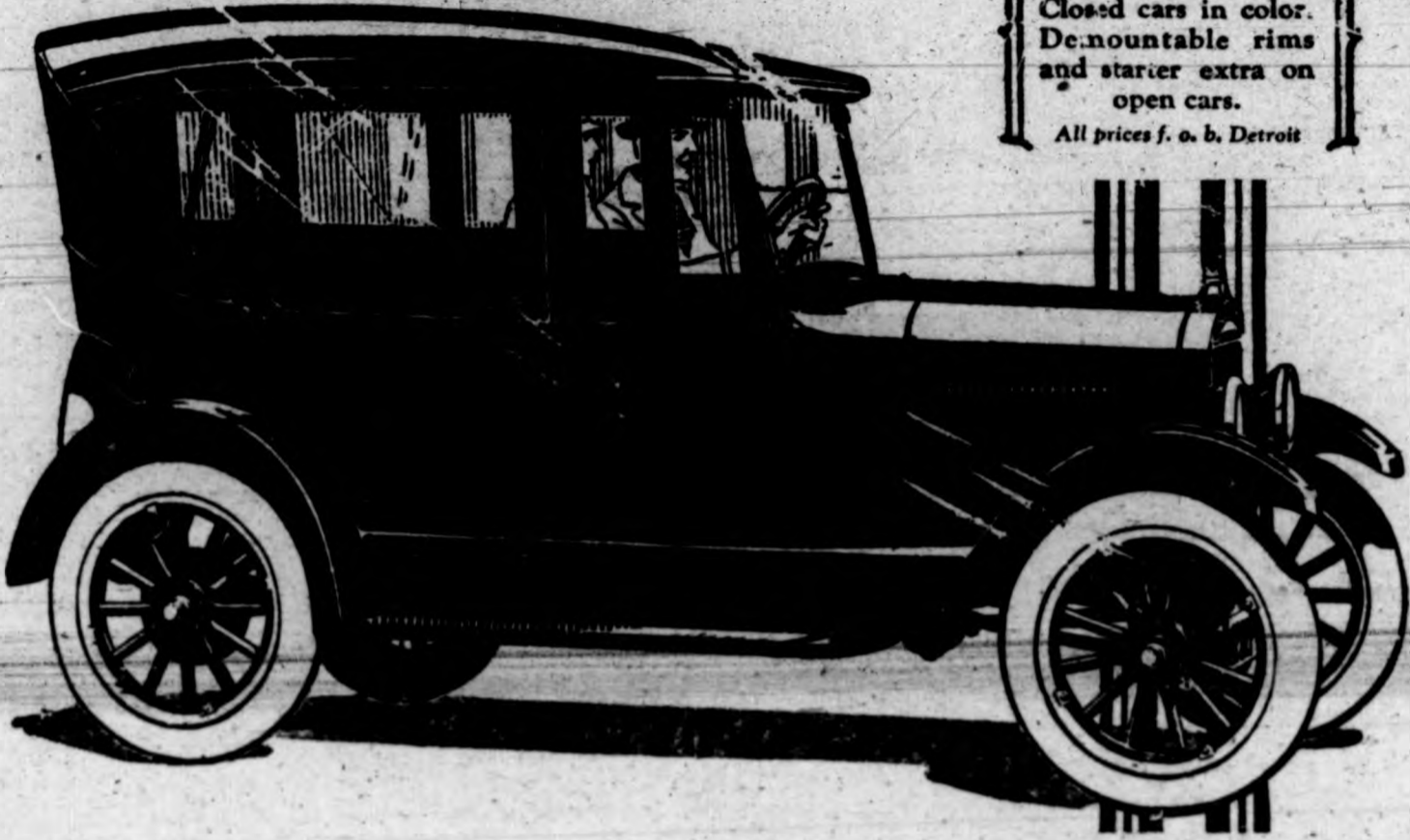

Practical Instructions In HOME SEWING

FITTING SLEEVE PATTERNS

The points marked A, B, C and D on the sketch should be noticed first in fitting. If, when the elbow is bent, the sleeve seems to pull from the shoulder, a section should be added at the top as shown at D. If this does not entirely remedy the fault make a few tiny gathers at the seam as at F. This may make it necessary to add a small section at the bottom as at G. If the sleeve seems to draw from the front of the armhole a section added as at H will help it. I shows the alteration to be made when the sleeve draws from the back of the armhole.

Will Case Mistrial.

Allendale, Dec. 6.—The only case submitted to the jury at the term of court of common pleas which commenced here Monday and adjourned Wednesday, December 3, was the case of W. A. Rouse and W. R. Girn, vs. Serena Simmons and Elizabeth Jeffcoat, respondents, which resulted in a mistrial. The respondents are the sisters and only heirs-at-law of L. S. Pender, who died last May at Cohen's Bluff, leaving an estate, the value of which is estimated at about \$30,000.

This case was appealed from a decree of Special Probate Judge for Allendale County, owing to the disqualification of J. E. Tobin, the regular probate judge. Judge Hiers sustained the will and admitted it to probate in solemn form.

The issues submitted to the jury at the court of common pleas involved the question of whether the will was executed by the deceased, L. S. Pender, and if so, was he at the time of the execution mentally incapacitated to execute the will, or was his signature procured by fraud or undue influence, holding that there was no evidence to go to the jury on this point. The remaining issues as to the actual signing of the will and the question of mental capacity and fraud were submitted to the jury.
