Husband Kills Wife and Shoots Himself

Orangeburg, Dec. 21.—Mrs. Dora E. Way, prominent in local politics, was shot and killed today by, it is alleged, her husband, Allen Way, at their home in the lower part of Orangeburg County. Way then shot himself twice and is now in a serious condition at the city hospital here.

After shooting his wife with a pistol, Way turned the weapon upon himself but a son, Allen, Jr., grappled with him in an effort to prevent him killing himself. He inflicted a serious wound, however, and later secured a shotgun which he fired into his right shoulder.

A dispute about the sale of some turkeys brought on a quarrel between the couple, according to information received here. Way was placed under guard at the hospital where he is receiving medical care. Allen Way, Jr., a married son, took the younger children to his home.

Mrs. Way had twice been a candidate for the Legislature, and was active in public affairs generally. Her father, Dr. W. S. Barton, was prominent in South Carolina affairs during the Tillman era of the nineties, when he was a State Senator.

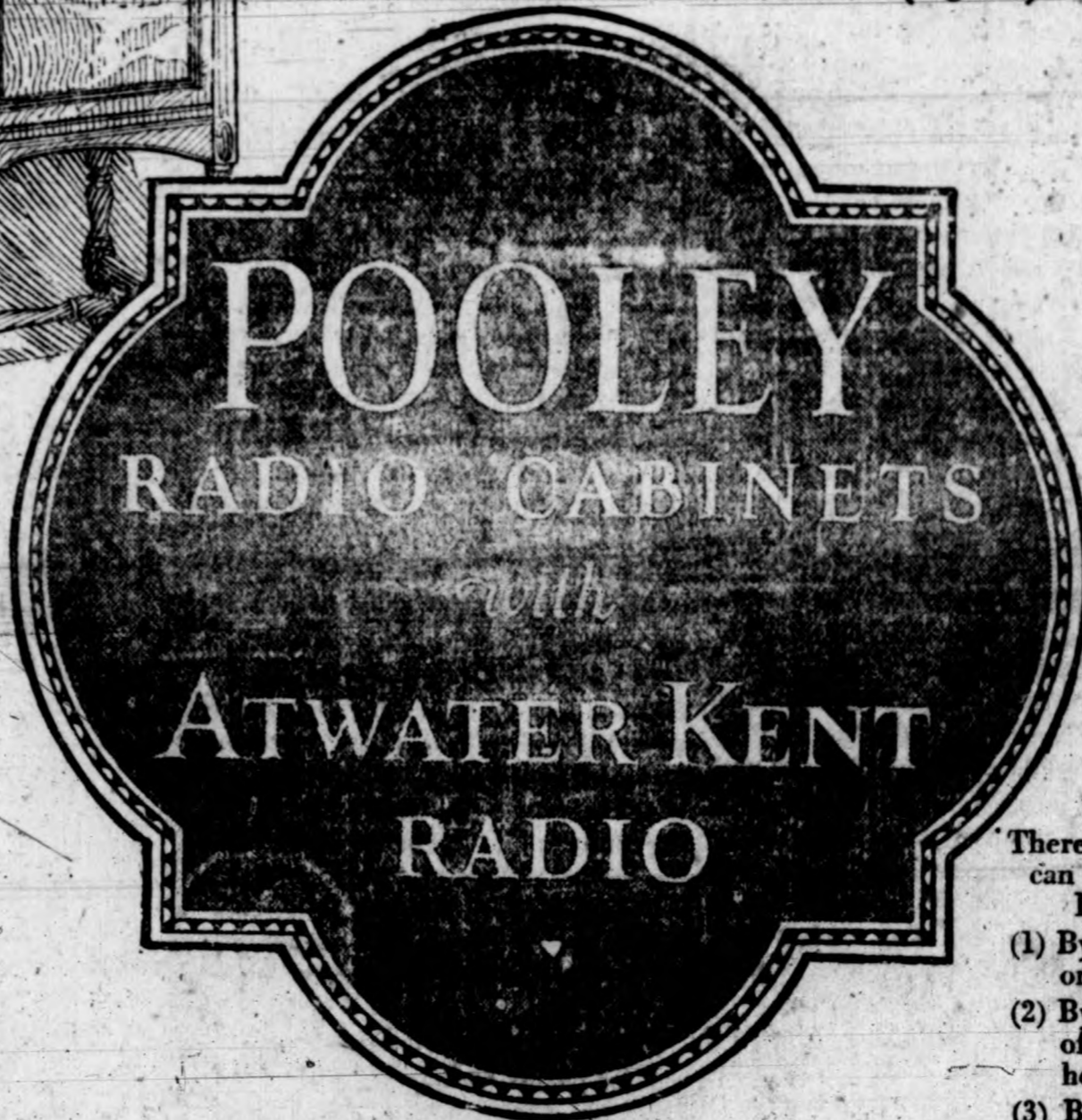
