Barnwell Highway Included in Program

About Four Miles of County Road From Barnwell Toward Denmark to Be Earth Surfaced.

The State highway department called for bids Friday on one-fifth of the \$5,000,000 road building program approved by the highway commission the previous Tuesday in its first meeting since Governor Johnston's ouster proceedings began. The department will open bids May 5th for 25 road and bridge construction projects in 22 counties at a cost of \$1,000,000.
