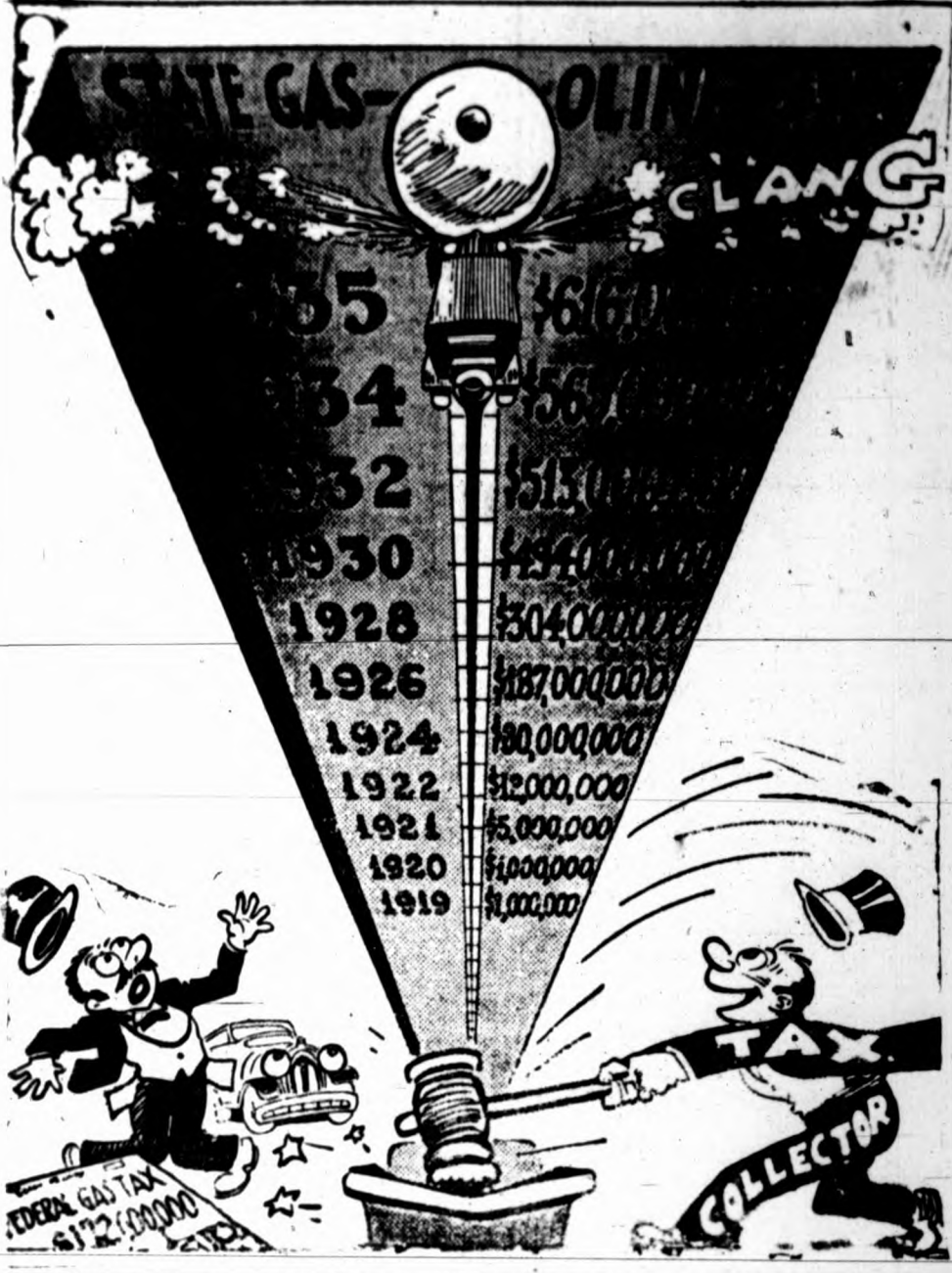


He Never Fails!



Native of Bamberg Builds His Own Car

Herman Hill, Skilled Mechanic, Now of Detroit, Values Vehicle at \$3,500.

Bamberg, July 18.—Herman Hill, a native of Bamberg, and an expert mechanic, has always wanted an automobile with "everything on it."

Now he has it—the work of his own hands. Mr. Hill says that the car stood him just about \$3,500, and anybody who has inspected the machine does not doubt it, for it is a "classy" car in every respect, built according to his own design and specifications.

Mr. Hill is the son of the late J. W. Hill, of Bamberg, who died recently. Mr. Hill has lived and plied his trade in Detroit, Mich., for several years. Upon the death of his father a wire was sent him. His own built car brought him home well in time for the funeral. Mr. Hill does not believe in violating traffic laws, but the time was limited, and he sped along at 90 miles an hour frequently in order to be here when his father was buried.

Road-Hugging Model.

About two and a half years ago Mr. Hill decided to build the car he has always wanted. He frankly confesses he could not have paid for a custom-built machine like he wanted. Today he owns a blue-green and chrome plated car with a most unusual front. It is a road hugging motor car with a 143-inch wheel-base.

The instrument board is Mr. Hill's pride and the wonder of everybody who has seen it. It resembles the control board of a modern airliner—with an ampere meter, a clock, gasoline gauge, oil gauge, tachometer, heat indicator, cigarette lighter, eight light switches, and numerous other gadgets—28 in all—for every conceivable purpose one could imagine.

Parts from other makes of machines were used freely in the construction of the car. He first started with the frame, doing the welding himself. He bought a Chrysler front axle and some Hudson springs at a wrecking lot.

A Graham-Paige rear axle was also picked up, and he bought a Packard motor. The driving shaft he made himself. A Cadillac steering column and assembly were installed, and it was set off with an Essex radiator. He bought the steel and welded the body together. He had some help with the upholstering and he did the

paint job himself, ten coats of lacquer.

Has Two Generators.

Features of the car include two generators, one for the starter and one for the lights and radio. The car has a built-in trunk and seats that can easily be turned into a bed. Mr. Hill figures that he spent approximately 2,500 hours working on his car, and at a dollar an hour this would be \$2,500, and that the actual cash outlay approximated \$1,000.

He was asked if he would sell it for \$3,500, and he replied that he probably would—if he had an offer—and that he would start right in building another one to incorporate some things he forgot. He says he has a lot of new ideas which he would like to try out if he ever builds another one.

The Dance.

Number of Improvements.

The educational department has recently added a wood lathe and joiner to its equipment. This was furnished by headquarters at Fort Moultrie.

The 29 new men are doing a thousand things to improve matters. One has been burning the school house ceiling, a couple have been building shelves and simple furniture in the kitchen, others have cleaned up the woodyard, cut the weeds over the whole area, and spading up the ground

directly in front of the camp for seeding.

One of the most helpful of the ventures undertaken by the new men was transplanting a couple of good-sized wild cherry trees from the borders of the camp area to a place right in the center and front of the camp. There is considerable speculation and some betting as to whether or not they will survive the hot and dry weather.

New Personnel.

Malcolm McCutcheon, who has been stationed at the Pontiac camp since he joined the Forestry service about a month ago, has been transferred to this camp. Mr. McCutcheon graduated in engineering at the University of South Carolina in June. While here he will be in charge of surveying over a wide area of the county.

Lieut. W. H. Lacey, medical officer, stationed at the Montmorenci camp, will be in charge of the medical needs of this camp, also. He made his first visit here Saturday, July 17th.

In the Woods.

Because a large detail under Clyde Padgett went down to Luray last week to work on the project down there, only Mr. Murray, Mr. Edgerton, Mr. McCutcheon and leader J. B. Potter were in charge of crews here.

Mr. Murray was working on the house at the Dunbarton tower; Mr. Edgerton was working on the out-buildings at the Elko tower, Mr. McCutcheon had a surveying crew, and leader Potter had a crew clearing and then planting Crotonaria at the Barnwell tower.

The bulk of the men this week will be engaged in truck trails.
