Fulmer Asks Approval.

Orangeburg, Oct. 14.-In connection with a plea for South Carolina to approve an amendment to the Constitution in the November election to make provision for the participation in the social security act, Representative H. P. Fulmer has announced the following information from the Chairman of the Social Security Board at Washington in connection with the law:

"This act not only provides the payment up to fifteen dollars per month to old people sixty-five years of age and above, provided this amount is matched by the various States, but under Title X of this act provides for federal grants to States which administer aid to the blind in accordance with the standards prescribed in the federal act. This act also provides for dependent and crippled children. In order to receive federal funds for these purposes, the State must present to the Social Security Board a State plan for the administration of assistance and the board is by law directed to approve plans which meet specific requirements."

Mr. Fulmer states: "Thirty odd States have already complied and are now receiving federal aid for these purposes. Before those who are eligible under the social security act will be able to receive these benefits in South Carolina, it is necessary for the electorate of the State to approve a constitutional amendment which is being submitted this November."
